Summary of key findings for parents

This provision requires improvement. It is not yet good because:

- Assessment and monitoring are not used effectively to check that children make expected levels or rates of progress. The childminder does not identify next steps in children's learning and ensure they make good levels of progress.
- The childminder does not use activities effectively to challenge children and move them forward in their learning. Children's progress is steady rather than good overall.
- The childminder does not consistently help children to understand, manage and express their feelings.

It has the following strengths

- The childminder implements carefully considered policies and procedures to support children's good health and safety. The childminder effectively assesses and minimises risks at her home and on outings to help keep children safe from harm.
- The childminder involves parents in their children's learning. For example, she illustrates and shares children's current interests and activities with their parents, so they can extend children's learning at home.
- Children build good relationships with the childminder.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage the provider must:

provide more opportunities for children to learn to express their feelings and emotions more effectively.

- The inspector sampled a range of documentation, including policies and procedures, written communications from parents and children's development records.
- The inspector spoke to the childminder about her responsibilities to safeguard children.
- The inspector discussed the childminder's continued professional development and how this improved outcomes for children.
- The inspector listened to, and spoke with, the children as they played.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management requires improvement

The childminder has met the previous actions raised by Ofsted. For example, she has improved the way she manages children's behaviour. She has updated her policies and procedures to support continuity in children's care and shared them with their parents. However, the childminder does not fully help children to express themselves positively to build on these improvements. In addition, she does not use assessment well or offer enough challenge to children, to help them progress well in their learning. Safeguarding is effective. The childminder has a good knowledge of safeguarding issues, including how to identify and respond appropriately to any concerns about a child's welfare. The childminder uses professional development to improve her practice.

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Quality of teaching, learning and assessment requires improvement

The childminder observes children as they play and assesses their achievements across all areas of learning and development. However, her assessments do not accurately reflect children's levels of progress or help her to identify the next steps in their learning. The childminder is well qualified and provides children with opportunities for play and learn at her home and out in the community. Children enjoy their time with the childminder and the activities she provides. However, the childminder does not always provide sufficient challenge to help children reach their potential.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare require improvement

The childminder is quick to soothe children when they are upset, but she rarely models ways to help them express how they feel. However, she nurtures children towards increasing levels of confidence and independence and they are beginning to understand her behavioural expectations. She talks through the plans for the day to help children understand the sequence of activities, such as eating lunch before they go on an outing. The childminder does not offer children stimulating and challenging learning experiences, to effectively motivate them to learn.

Outcomes for children require improvement

Most children are confident and happy to try new ventures, such as craft activities at toddler groups or going to pre-school. They enjoy playing with small-world characters, begin to talk about what they are doing and enjoy their imaginative play. They have some skills that prepare them well for new and different activities. However, children do not always make good rates of progress from their starting points, to reach their potential or become fully ready for school.

The childminder registered in 2006. She lives in the South Ham area of Basingstoke, in Hampshire. The childminder operates her service each weekday from 8am to 6pm, all year round. This is with the exception of bank holidays and family holidays. She receives funding for the provision of free early education for children aged two, three and four years. The childminder holds an appropriate qualification at level 3.

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
