

# **Summary of key findings for parents**

## This provision is good

- Following the previous inspection, the manager has made good use of training available to extend the professional development of the staff team. Consequently, this has raised the quality of provision.
- Children's emotional well-being is positively promoted. They are respected, valued and listened to. For example, children are given the responsibility to initiate and display their own rules for behaviour. As a result, children are kind and show empathy towards each other.
- The established staff team helps to provide a warm family environment which supports children in gaining a sense of belonging. They have a good understanding of children's individualities and sensitively engage with them in their play.
- The manager uses good systems for self-evaluation. She seeks the views of parents, in order to continue identifying ways in which they can develop the club's practice even further. Parents comment that they are very happy with the club, particularly with the flexibility it offers.
- The club has established strong links with the community and participates in local events, such as the carnival and the church flower festival. The local Police Community Support Officer visits the club to talk to the children about staying safe.

### It is not yet outstanding because:

An effective flow of information between the club and the primary school is not yet securely established to support children's learning.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

extend the sharing of information with the primary school, so that children benefit from greater consistency in their learning experiences.

## **Inspection activities**

- The inspector observed the activities indoors and outdoors, and the interactions between staff and children.
- The inspector talked to staff and children at appropriate times during the inspection.
- The inspector completed a joint observation with the club manager.
- The inspector held a meeting with the club manager and looked at relevant documentation, including evidence to support the ongoing suitability of staff.
- The inspector spoke to the class teacher of the school and to a small number of parents during the inspection and took account of their views.

# **Inspection findings**

## Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. All staff undergo Disclosure and Barring Service Checks before working with children. Additionally, strong recruitment and selection procedures ensure that staff are safe and suitable to work with children. The manager and staff undertake child protection training annually, in order to keep up to date with the latest information and legislation. They are aware of the signs and symptoms that may raise concerns regarding children's safety and welfare. Furthermore, all staff hold paediatric first-aid qualifications and respond appropriately to accidents. Detailed risk assessments are in place to minimise potential hazards. The manager now has staff supervision meetings securely embedded to evaluate the quality of practice. She is also now aware of her duty to notify Ofsted about any significant events or changes to the provision.

## Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff set up the environment before they collect children from school, so that there are toys and resources for them to start playing with as they arrive. The well-qualified staff team delivers a good variety of activities to interest and stimulate children. For example, staff produce an array of objects on a tray; they cover the tray and remove an object. The children identify the missing object. Staff offer clues and encouragement to assist children to achieve. The staff and children participate in this turn-taking game for a sustained period of time. This activity helps to develop children's visual memory skills. However, staff do not always supplement the learning occurring in school. Nevertheless, staff are beginning to record children's observations and document their learning, in order to better understand their interests and levels of development.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children move freely and confidently around the room socialising with friends. They interact warmly with staff and invite them into their play. This shows that the children have developed good attachments with the staff. They welcome the children into the club with a drink and a healthy snack. Children practise good hygiene routines as they independently wash their hands before eating. Staff are good role models. They encourage children to be physically active by initiating energetic games outdoors where children of all ages play cooperatively together.

Pinchbeck Kids Club was registered in 2003. It is situated in a mobile building within the school grounds. The club employs three members of childcare staff. Of these, all hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 3. The club opens every day in term time from 7.30am until 9am and from 3.15pm until 6pm. The club also opens during school holidays from 7.30am until 6pm, except for a week at Christmas.

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register.
