## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder recognises the importance of discussing care arrangements and sharing information with parents and other professionals to help her meet children's individual needs.
- The childminder is aware of her responsibility to support children's safety. She is aware of the potential signs and symptoms that may indicate concerns about a child's welfare and knows the procedures to follow if necessary.
- The childminder understands the value of self-evaluation and identifying areas for improvement. She also understands how to include the views of parents and children.
- The childminder knows how to assess children's learning and the importance of planning a range of challenging activities to support their interests. She understands how to monitor children's progress to help them achieve well.
- The childminder recognises the importance of helping children to build relationships, to be respectful for others and to behave well. She knows how to help children develop confidence and independence to help prepare them for starting school.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed the childminder's understanding of the safeguarding and welfare requirements, and the systems she has in place to help keep children safe.
- The inspector talked to the childminder about her understanding of the learning and development requirements.
- The inspector looked at and discussed with the childminder the policies, procedures and documentation she will use when caring for children.
- The inspector checked evidence of the childminder's qualifications and evidence of the suitability of all adult household members.
- The inspector observed areas to be used for the care of children, along with the furniture, equipment and toys that are to be used for childminding.

The childminder is available Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, from 7am to 8.40am, during the school term, and Monday to Friday, from 7am to 6pm, during the school holidays. The childminder holds a childcare qualification at level 3. There were no children on role in the early years age range at the time of this inspection.
