## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder knows how to use observations to plan activities that help children to make progress and prepare them for their next stage in learning.
- The childminder understands how to work with parents and other early years settings to share information and to support continuity of children's care and learning.
- The childminder understands how to encourage children's behaviour and develop their self-esteem and confidence.
- The childminder understands the importance of supporting children's health and well-being. She has arrangements to enable children to enjoy fresh air and exercise, and to teach them appropriate hygiene routines.
- The childminder understands her responsibilities for safeguarding children, including the procedures to follow in the event of a concern about a child's welfare. She has risk assessment procedures to provide safe environments for children.
- The childminder is aware of the importance of reviewing and improving the service she provides. She attends mandatory training and keeps her knowledge up to date.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver the educational programmes for children and assess their progress.
- The inspector examined a selection of documentation and policies that the childminder will use when caring for children.
- The inspector discussed self-evaluation systems with the childminder.
- The inspector assessed the childminder's understanding of safeguarding and her knowledge of child protection procedures.
- The inspector observed the areas of the home that children will use as well as the furniture, equipment and toys.

The childminder registered in 2012. She lives in Brixham, Devon. The childminder offers care after school on a Monday to Friday from 3pm to 5.30pm. There were no children on roll in the early years age group at the time of the inspection.
