### Summary of key findings for parents

#### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands how to promote children's learning, including how to monitor their development and plan activities to support their individual needs and interests.
- The childminder knows how to protect children's welfare. For example, she is aware of the signs and symptoms that may raise cause her concern about the welfare of a child, and she knows the procedures to follow for reporting any concerns.
- The childminder understands how to support healthy lifestyles and children's understanding of hygiene practices, such as through the daily routines and providing regular opportunities for children to engage in physical activity.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents and other professionals to support children's overall care and learning needs.
- The childminder values the importance of evaluating her practice and keeps up to date with childcare practices. For example, she liaises with her local development worker and meets with other childminders to keep herself fully informed.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
