Summary of key findings for parents

The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder does not hold a current paediatric first-aid certificate. This compromises children's safety in the event of an accident. This weakness is also a breach of the Childcare Register requirements.
- The childminder understands safeguarding procedures. She has clear procedures to follow, and knows how to report any concerns to relevant agencies.
- The childminder has a wide range of toys and resources that she will use, to help children make progress. She understands how she will use observations and assessments to inform children's next steps, and plan age-appropriate activities.
- The childminder understands how to work positively with parents and other professionals, to establish a consistent approach in children's care and education.
- The childminder knows how to support children to behave well. For example, she understands how to role model appropriate behaviour, such as respect and tolerance, to help prepare them for their future learning.
- The childminder knows how to evaluate her provision, to help improve her practice.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and the Childcare Register the provider must:

- obtain and maintain a paediatric first-aid qualification, to help keep children safe. 30/06/2017

Inspection activities

- The inspector toured the areas of the premises available for childminding, and checked the suitability of the available toys and resources.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder about how she intends to deliver the safeguarding and welfare requirements, and the learning and development requirements.
- The inspector examined relevant documents, including the childminder's first-aid certificate, and safeguarding policies and procedures.

The childminder registered in 1994, and lives in Hayes, in the London Borough of Hillingdon. She offers her service from, 7am to 6pm, Monday to Friday, except on bank holidays, and family holidays. There were no children in the early years range on roll at the time of inspection.
