Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Children benefit greatly from having access to a well resourced, stimulating learning environment. They are motivated and eager to have a go and try new experiences. Children progress well, confidently explore and learn to make independent choices about their play.
- Partnerships with parents are strong. The childminder shares good quality information about children's learning and progress to help parents further support children's learning at home.
- The childminder teaches children about the benefits of eating well and the importance of good hygiene routines. She provides a very good range of nutritious meals and snacks that children enjoy.
- The childminder provides children with a wide range of exciting and interesting learning experiences. For example, children enjoy regular outings in the local community, where they can be active, meet other people and develop new skills.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- The childminder has not fully established effective partnerships with all early years settings that children attend to help them to work closely together to meet children's learning needs.
- The childminder does not fully focus on ways to further improve her good professional development, to raise standards in teaching and learning to the highest level.

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What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- enhance the arrangements further for working in partnership with other early years settings children attend, to provide a fully consistent approach to children's learning
- extend the programme of professional development, to raise standards in teaching to a higher level.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector completed an evaluation of an activity with the childminder.
- The inspector reviewed relevant documentation, including children's learning journals and a sample of policies and procedures. She also discussed the childminder's self-evaluation with her.
- The inspector checked evidence of the childminder's qualifications and evidence of the suitability of all adults working and living in the household.
- The inspector spoke with the childminder and children at appropriate times during the inspection. She took account of the written views of parents.

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Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. The childminder fully understands her role and responsibility to keep children safe. She knows who to contact should she have a concern about a child's welfare. Children are kept safe and secure. For example, the childminder carries out thorough risk assessments and daily safety checks in all areas they use, to help minimise any hazards. The childminder reflects on her practice and consults with parents to help her identify areas for development. Parents regularly share a wealth of information about their children. They are extremely complimentary about the childminder and the care and teaching she provides.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The childminder carries out observations and assessments of children's development. She has a clear understanding of what children need to learn next. She carefully plans interesting activities based on this information to help children learn more. The childminder promotes communication and language very effectively and engages children in conversations. For example, she encourages them to explain what they are doing and remember what they saw on a recent walk. The childminder supports children's mathematical skills well, she plays alongside them, supporting them to practise their counting skills. Children are beginning to recognise shapes and sizes during creative play.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

The childminder offers a warm and welcoming environment. Children benefit from strong relationships with the childminder. She knows their individual needs and personalities very well. This helps her to promote children's emotional well-being effectively. The childminder helps children learn how to be kind and behave well. She offers simple age-appropriate explanations about the importance of sharing. Children behave very well as the childminder praises them and uses effective methods to recognise and reward good behaviour. In addition, she gives children clear recognition for their achievements and developing skills, to boost their self-esteem.

Outcomes for children are good

All children make good progress in their learning. They are starting to acquire the essential skills they need for the next stages in learning and the move on to school. Children are growing in independence. For example, they learn how to put on their shoes and coats before going outdoors. Children are happy, motivated and inquisitive learners. For example, they remain engrossed as they play with foam, selecting various vehicles to make marks. They go on to describe the different colours they are making as they add paint to the foam.
