This provision is outstanding

- The childminder provides an extremely exciting range of resources and activities to motivate and interest children. Children become highly engaged in play and make rapid progress in their learning.
- Overall, the childminder works closely with parents to ensure that all children receive the right support to meet their individual needs.
- Children have excellent opportunities to socialise. They are extremely confident and show high levels of cooperation.
- Extremely high priority is given to planning activities. The childminder challenges children's learning through his teaching.
- Children receive excellent support from the childminder, who has a focused development plan to continue to develop children's learning.
- Promoting British values are at the heart of the childminder's setting.
- The childminder provides an excellent level of assessment and children are making rapid progress in their learning.

implement plans to involve parents in a range of ways, to continue to improve their children's excellent learning outcomes.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is outstanding

Safeguarding is effective. The childminder is trained to identify and support children who may be at risk of harm. For example, he uses monitors in the sleep area to help keep children safe. The childminder continually reviews his practice and explores innovative ways to enhance his provision. Effective steps are taken to evaluate the provision and identify key strengths and areas for development. For instance, he recognises that he could do even more to utilise the relationship with parents, such as when assessing children's play interests. The childminder makes excellent use of working relationships with local schools to support children's transitions. He has an exceptional understanding of how children learn, resulting in highly successful activities.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is outstanding

The childminder takes account of the children's needs extremely well. He makes precise assessments of children's learning based on his observations of their play. He uses information gathered to monitor children's progress highly effectively and sets suitable challenges to extend their learning. For example, he uses varied resources to help extend children's mathematical learning and ability to solve problems. The childminder encourages parents to observe children's play in the setting to further extend children's learning. The childminder successfully encourages children to become independent learners. He has an extensive range of resources. Children access purpose-built areas to further explore their play.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are outstanding

Children flourish as their emotional and physical well-being is extremely well supported. Children assuredly explore the exciting environment and thoroughly enjoy leading their play. They benefit from exceptional daily outdoor experiences, gaining an understanding of the world and developing their physical skills from a very young age. The childminder is an excellent role model for children, and children learn to share and consider others. Children are keen to include the childminder in their play. The childminder is highly effective in supporting children to understand feelings and promotes respect for others.

Outcomes for children are outstanding

Children are extremely well supported and make excellent progress in all areas of their learning and development. The childminder is highly aware of each child as a unique individual. Children thrive in the highly welcoming and child-centred environment. Effective steps are taken to assess the provision and identify key strengths and areas for development. The quality of childcare and education that children receive is very effective and consistently improved.
