Summary of key findings for parents

This provision requires improvement. It is not yet good because:

- Ofsted has not been notified of changes to the management committee. The risk to children is minimal as the committee do not have unsupervised contact with children.
- Some aspects of the leader and staff's knowledge of safeguarding are not as strong as others.
- Staff sometimes fail to recognise when children become restless and uninterested during group times. Some group times are too long and children lose interest.

It has the following strengths

- The children are well settled. They have developed good relationships with the staff and their peers. Children enjoy their time in the setting.
- The setting is well organised to allow the children to make their own choices and decisions about what they would like to do.
- Children make good progress from their starting points. Staff get to know the children well. They know each child's individual needs and support them to make the best possible progress.
- All children, including those with English as an additional language, develop good language and communication skills.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

Inspection activities

- The inspector took into account the views of the parents spoken to on the day of the inspection.
- The inspector observed the quality of teaching and the interactions between the staff and children.
- The inspector looked at written documents, including staff files, policies, procedures and risk assessments.
- The inspector held a leadership and management meeting with the manager and spoke to the staff and children at appropriate times during the inspection.
- The inspector carried out a joint inspection with the manager.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management requires improvement

Safeguarding is effective. Staff understand and recognise the indicators of abuse. They have a good understanding of the procedures that they should follow if they have concerns about a child's welfare. They understand most of the situations that may mean they are unsuitable to work with children and the need to inform the leader about this. However, the leader and staff's knowledge of disqualification by association is less secure. Ofsted has not been informed of some changes to the management committee but the risk to children is judged as minimal. The staff and leader reflect and evaluate on their practice well. They regularly seek the views of the parents and reflect on every aspect of the setting. Parents are happy with the service that is being provided and they feel well informed about their child's progress.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff use good procedures to get to know the children. Staff regularly observe and monitor the children's progress to plan exciting and interesting activities. Children are keen to make their own gardens using real grass, plants and paper bowls. Children are confident and keen to show their skills. For example, they are eager to demonstrate how they can use the climbing frame in the garden. They make their own choices and are content looking at books alone or playing with their peers with the resources. Children develop their literacy skills well as they look at letters and sound them out. Children are beginning to recognise the letters that are in their names.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare require improvement

The breaches in requirements relating to children's welfare are judged to have a minimal impact on children's well-being. Staff use good procedures to help the children to settle and they work well with the parents to support children who are struggling with the separation. Children play cooperatively and support each other well. They help each other to make a bridge in the garden with large blocks. Children hold hands and support their friends to balance as they walk over the bridge. Children behave well and are polite. Staff support the children to be independent at meeting their own needs and know the routines well.

Outcomes for children are good

Children make good progress from their starting points. They are keen to learn and develop a good mathematical awareness. For example, they learn to estimate and compare quantities in the sand using the large scales. Children are independent and motivated learners. They enjoy developing their physical skills using the bars in the garden to swing and stretch. All children, including those who have special educational needs and/or disabilities, are well prepared for the next stage in their learning.
