Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands the learning and development requirements. She knows how to assess children's learning and how to help all children make good progress from their starting points.
- The childminder understands the importance of promoting children's independence, self-confidence and positive emotional well-being. She demonstrates a good understanding of inclusive practice and how to promote this in her setting.
- The childminder demonstrates secure knowledge of how to promote partnership working with parents, other professionals and other settings children attend. She understands the importance of consistency and continuity for children.
- The childminder understands her role in keeping children safe and protecting them from harm. She has prepared a safe, welcoming environment and has robust procedures to follow if she has concerns about children.
- The childminder has good links with the local authority and childminder network groups. She plans to use these to share good practice and help maintain her skills.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver the educational programmes for children and undertake observation, assessment and planning.
- The inspector discussed the policies and procedures with the childminder and viewed documentation that she will use when caring for children.
- The inspector toured the areas of the premises used by children and discussed the equipment and toys available.
- The inspector discussed the safeguarding and welfare requirements with the childminder and took into consideration the suitability checks.

The childminder registered in 1996. She lives in the Norton area of Stockton-on-Tees. The childminder operates her provision during term time, from 8am to 5.30pm, Monday to Thursday, except for bank holidays and family holidays.
