## Summary of key findings for parents

## This provision is inadequate

- The provider does not consistently follow secure recruitment procedures to ensure staff are suitable for their roles and to promote safe practices.
- The provider has failed to complete the necessary notifications to Ofsted regarding changes to the committee. Ofsted has been unable to carry out all the required checks to determine the committee members' suitability for their role. This is also a breach of the requirements of the Childcare Register.
- The manager does not monitor staff teaching practice effectively. Staff do not receive the guidance they need to have high expectations for all children or to consistently deliver high-quality teaching.
- Staff do not monitor children's progress accurately. They do not consistently plan learning experiences that children find exciting or fully challenging. Not all children make the progress that they should.
- Self-evaluation is weak. The manager has not accurately identified where improvements are required.

#### It has the following strengths

- Staff ensure children are safe and settled. They speak kindly to the children, who enjoy playing with their friends. Staff closely supervise children throughout the day.
- The manager builds useful partnerships with staff at local schools. She uses the shared information well to help children manage the move and develop early writing skills.

## What the setting needs to do to improve further

## **Inspection findings**

#### Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

Arrangements for the safe recruitment of staff are not robust enough. The provider obtains the necessary Disclosure and Barring Service checks but does not complete other assessments of staff suitability. In addition, the provider has failed to provide Ofsted with the required information to check committee members' suitability. These omissions compromise children's safety. Safeguarding is ineffective. However, the manager and staff have a secure understanding of what to do if they are concerned about a child's welfare. The manager has made some improvements since the last inspection, such as presenting reading materials in a more inviting way. However, self-evaluation is not accurate enough to identify or address the more pressing weaknesses, such as those in the quality of teaching and assessment.

#### Quality of teaching, learning and assessment requires improvement

Staff's lack of accuracy around assessments means that they do not always have a clear enough picture of what each child can do and, therefore, they do not provide good levels of challenge. For example, staff miss opportunities to extend the counting and thinking skills of children who are playing independently, focusing on their safety and not involving themselves well in their play to extend their learning. Staff are more successful at teaching children who prefer to take part in more structured activities. Staff have opportunities to improve their skills and use these well to help older children learn to recognise and write their names and other familiar words. They encourage children to express their own ideas, such as through the use of art materials. They teach children about size and shape as they complete puzzles.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

The provider cannot assure children's well-being due to weaknesses in safeguarding practice. In addition, the inconsistencies in learning experiences have a negative impact on children's ability to develop into keen and inquisitive learners. However, staff are kind and encouraging and, overall, children enjoy their time at pre-school. Staff work well with parents to help children settle in, which promotes their sense of belonging. Staff meet children's physical needs in a suitable fashion, for example, children are able to spend prolonged periods outdoors engaged in active play. Children learn to understand and respect the similarities and differences between themselves and others.

#### **Outcomes for children require improvement**

Overall, children acquire a suitable range of skills in preparation for school. For example, they learn to take turns, follow appropriate hygiene routines and distinguish different letter sounds. However, due to the inconsistencies in teaching, children do not make as rapid progress from their starting points as they should.
