# Summary of key findings for parents

## This provision is good

- The provider is very experienced and is an excellent role model for staff. She leads by example and is a natural communicator with children to help extend their learning. The provider works well with her knowledgeable deputy and the staff team. They are highly effective in monitoring children's progress to ensure gaps in learning are closing.
- Parents speak highly about the provision and about how much their children have achieved since attending. They receive regular updates about their children's progress.
- Partnerships with other professionals, including other providers, are strong. Staff are proactive in sharing information effectively about children's care and learning. This contributes to providing continuity of care for children's needs.
- Staff provide children with consistent praise and encouragement. This builds on children's self-esteem and, consequently, they are willing to have a go at new experiences. Staff help younger children to learn how to share popular toys and they learn to respect each other's feelings, which supports their good social skills.
- The management team and staff demonstrate a dedicated drive to provide a highquality service for children and their families. They attend regular training, such as supporting children's emotional development, and implement new knowledge gained.

# It is not yet outstanding because:

At times, staff do not plan changes to routines effectively, such as arrival times and the routine of moving between the indoor and outdoor play areas.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

review the management of transition times, such as arrival times and moving between the indoor and outdoor areas, to help younger children to continually feel settled and secure.

## **Inspection activities**

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and outdoors. She assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector spoke with the staff team and children at appropriate times during the inspection.
- The inspector carried out a joint observation with the deputy.
- The inspector looked at samples of children's records and examples of the policies implemented, such as the safeguarding procedures. She looked at evidence of the suitability of staff working with the children.
- The inspector spoke to parents during the inspection and took account of their views.

# **Inspection findings**

## Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. The manager and the deputy share information from all training and network meetings related to child protection with the staff. Clear policies and procedures are regular reviewed and understood by the staff. Staff routinely carry out risk assessments to ensure that all areas and resources are safe for children to use. The manager and her staff team know the children well. They work closely together to observe, assess and continually plan for children's ongoing learning. Staff provide parents with information about the planned activities. They are able to contribute to this so that they can continue children's learning at home.

## Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is outstanding

Staff are well qualified and work hard to create a highly stimulating child-centred environment. They provide children with a wide range of creative and interesting learning experiences that helps to motivate them to learn more. For instance, children take a great interest in learning about the life cycle of butterflies. They watch in wonder at the chrysalis taking shape and engage excitingly in conversations about their release. Excellent teaching helps children to discover more and become deeply involved in their learning. Language development is extremely well supported. For example, staff skilfully use children's keen interest in sounds that letters represent to extend their understanding in all aspects of learning, including knowledge about the wider world and mathematics.

# Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Staff know the children well. They have a 'buddy' key-person system, which helps children to build relationships with more than one person. Staff gather information from parents about their children's individual care and learning needs to help ease their transition from home. Children learn about leading a healthy lifestyle. For example, they excitedly discover that the strawberries they have planted are ready to be picked and eaten. Since the last inspection, staff have implemented effective strategies to help children's learning during routines, such as mealtimes. Staff help children to develop their physical skills during their play. They make good use of the local environment; taking children on walks within the local community and promoting their safety at all times.

#### **Outcomes for children are outstanding**

Children make excellent progress from their starting points. This includes children who receive funding for their education. They rapidly gain skills they need to support their ongoing learning, such as starting school. Children are inquisitive and highly motivated to find out more during their day. They routinely write for a purpose and understand how to recognise numbers.
