Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- The childminder uses observation and assessment effectively to plan for each child's future learning. The partnership with parents is good with regard to sharing information and working together to ensure continuity of care and learning for children. Children make good progress.
- The childminder reviews her provision to improve. She demonstrates a strong commitment to keeping her early years knowledge up to date to meet children's care needs and promote their learning successfully.
- Children are emotionally secure in the childminder's care. Relationships between the childminder and the children are very good.
- Children practise their good manipulative skills in a variety of ways and in accordance with their different stages of development.
- Children explore and investigate. Older children enthusiastically engage in imaginative role play.
- Children make good progress in their mathematical development.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- The childminder does not fully promote young children's emerging use of simple sentences as they develop their speaking skills.
- The childminder does not fully support older children to link letters and sounds.

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What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- extend support for younger children as they begin to put two words together and form simple sentences
- increase support for older children as they begin to link letters with the sounds they make.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed activities while children played in the indoor and outdoor play areas. She discussed teaching methods with the childminder.
- The inspector looked at evidence of the childminder's training, and checked evidence of the suitability of all adults.
- The inspector looked at a selection of children's assessment records and planning, policies and procedures and a range of other documentation.
- The inspector spoke to the childminder and children at appropriate times through the inspection.
- The inspector took account of the views of parents.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. Children are always supervised and the play environment is safe and secure. The childminder is aware of the signs that a child's welfare may be at risk and she knows the local referral procedures to follow to protect children. She keeps her safeguarding knowledge up to date and is aware of the duty to prevent children from being drawn into situations that may put them at risk of significant of harm. Necessary suitability checks for all adults have been completed. As part of her systems for reviewing and improving her provision, the childminder attends local link meetings where early years issues are discussed. The partnerships with parents are good and they share very positive views about the childminder's provision.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The childminder challenges children effectively so that they acquire skills to reach the next steps in their learning. Children make good progress in their physical development. Young children use their good manipulative skills while playing with toys that have buttons and simple mechanisms. Older children are developing their imagination and while they play they create stories around toy people and animals. Children are currently exploring the life cycle of a butterfly. The childminder suggests that they paint on a long roll of paper to create a caterpillar. Children dip their hands and feet into paint. They explore the texture, name the colours and print repeatedly onto the paper. Older children mix the paint and talk about how colours can be changed.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

The childminder creates a warm and welcoming environment, and children are emotionally secure. She supports children's independence effectively. For example, toy boxes are clearly labelled with words and pictures, and children are encouraged to select resources for themselves. They develop an understanding of risk and how to keep themselves safe. The childminder reminds them periodically why they should tidy toys when they become a tripping hazard. Children's good health is promoted well. They are physically active each day. On a very hot and sunny day the childminder talks with them about why they must drink plenty of water and wear sun hats. Children behave well.

Outcomes for children are good

Children are developing good skills that help them to be ready for their move on to preschool and school. Children are safe, secure and happy. They learn to manage their selfcare needs competently. Older children express themselves confidently. They count and use mathematical language while they play. For example, they talk about using lots of bricks to build a big tower and a long bridge.
