## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder knows how to meet the safeguarding and welfare requirements, including how to identify and report any child protection concerns.
- The childminder understands the learning and development requirements. She knows how to observe, assess and plan for children's individual needs in order to help them make progress in preparation for future moves to school.
- The childminder is able to explain how she intends to help children understand their feelings and behaviour and learn to manage these themselves. She details how she plans to offer children daily outdoor play opportunities and to support them in understanding the importance of healthy lifestyles, such as eating well.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working in partnership with parents and other professionals involved in children's learning and development.
- The childminder understands the benefits of keeping her own skills up to date and evaluating her provision in order to continue to make further improvements.
- The childminder holds a current paediatric first-aid certificate. She has an up-to-date knowledge of how she would deal with accidents and is aware of the need to maintain records for accidents and injuries.
- The childminder knows how to maintain a safe environment for children to play and learn in. She knows how to identify and minimise risks to children to keep them safe.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector had a tour of the premises.
- The inspector talked to the childminder about her understanding of the learning and development requirements and how she will plan activities to meet children's needs.
- The inspector checked the childminder's knowledge of safeguarding.
- The inspector sampled relevant documentation that the childminder uses when caring for children.
- The inspector viewed documents relating to evidence of suitability of household members. The inspector talked with the childminder about her self-evaluation process and how she plans to continue to make improvements.
