Summary of key findings for parents

The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder does not have an awareness of her responsibilities to have regard to the 'Prevent' duty guidance for England and Wales 2015 to safeguard children. She has not reflected on her practice to ensure her knowledge is up to date.
- The childminder understands how to use observations of children's learning to plan for their next steps and monitor progress. She recognises the importance of working in partnership with parents and other professionals to promote continuity of learning.
- The childminder explains how she will plan stimulating and challenging activities for babies and older children. She knows how to help children develop foundations for future learning and recognises the importance of preparing them for starting school.
- The childminder has procedures to implement to help her get to know children when they first join the setting. She understands the importance of gathering and sharing information to meet children's individual care needs and promote inclusion.
- The childminder describes how she will support children to develop good levels of independence and confidence. She has procedures to follow to manage behaviour.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and the Childcare Register the provider must:
