# Summary of key findings for parents

### This provision is good

- The childminder effectively reviews her practice and builds positive relationships with parents and other professional partners. This helps to identify accurate targets that drive forward ongoing improvements so that all children make good progress.
- The childminder has a good understanding of how all children develop. She is particularly aware of the fluctuating emotional and physical needs of one-year-old children and supports them well. The childminder provides warm, loving care and responds quickly and sensitively to children's needs. This helps children to feel relaxed and safe and to engage in new experiences.
- The childminder has undertaken training on expectations of behaviour. This has helped her to understand what to expect during different stages of children's development. She has clear and realistic expectations for children's positive behaviour and consistently reinforces them. Children begin to learn to share and take turns.
- The childminder enthusiastically uses every interaction as an opportunity to build relationships and to develop children's understanding and use of language.

#### It is not yet outstanding because:

- The childminder does not consistently build on what children need to learn next to help them achieve as much as possible in their learning.
- There are not enough opportunities for children to gain an awareness of how they differ from, or are similar to, other people to extend their understanding of the world.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- sharpen the planning of activities provided so that they consistently build on what children need to learn next to help them achieve as much as possible in their learning
- provide children with more opportunities to build on their respect for, and understanding of, the similarities and differences between themselves and others in the wider community.

#### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector completed a joint evaluation of an activity with the childminder.
- The inspector held a number of discussions with the childminder. She looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of persons living in the household.
- The inspector spoke to children during the inspection.
- The inspector took account of the views of parents through written feedback provided.

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# **Inspection findings**

#### Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. The childminder is skilled at identifying and successfully minimising any potential risks to children. There is a comprehensive, upto-date safeguarding policy. The childminder is aware of the procedure she must follow if she has any concerns about a child. She fully involves parents in the assessment of children's learning when they first start at the setting. This helps the childminder to quickly develop next steps in children's learning from the outset. The childminder makes sure there is a good two-way exchange of information about each child's progress on an ongoing basis. This enhances parents' understanding about how their child's learning can be supported at home. The childminder strives to continually develop her already good knowledge and skills. She regularly attends the local authority early education funding meetings and undertakes other relevant training. This helps to keep her practice up to date and provides new ideas that promote good outcomes for all children.

## Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The childminder checks that the activities she provides support children to strengthen and deepen their skills in all aspects of their learning. For example, children concentrate as they attempt to hold the toy fishing rods steady and try to catch a fish. They squeal with delight when they succeed. Each child is praised for their attempts, developing their self-confidence. During such activities, the childminder describes what the children are doing to develop their understanding of language. She asks them questions to extend their thinking and vocabulary. The childminder supports children well so that they develop the skills they need in readiness for their move on to nursery or school.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

The childminder provides a playroom that is well resourced and organised so that children explore their own ideas and select and use toys and equipment independently. Meals and snacks provided are nutritious and balanced. There is direct access to the well-resourced garden and children have daily opportunities for outdoor play. Children take manageable risks in their play as they use the climbing and balancing equipment in the garden.

#### **Outcomes for children are good**

All children make good progress. Younger children experiment with making marks on the paper with the chalk. Older children draw simple shapes and talk about these with the childminder. Children listen intently as the childminder shares a book about the seaside with them. They excitedly respond to the childminder when she asks them to count the objects in the book. Toddlers engage in make-believe play and pretend to go shopping and pay with the toy money at the till. Children are self-assured and actively involved and persistent in their learning.
