Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- Staff do not always take immediate and prompt action to deal with hazards. For example, staff failed to ensure that cracked electrical sockets were made safe.
- Arrangements for sharing information with parents about their child's learning and development are weak. They are given minimal information about their own child's progress, especially in key areas such as literacy and maths for preschool children.
- Systems for observing and assessing children are inconsistent. As a result staff are unable to identify how well children are progressing and where they may need additional support
- Information for parents and staff about ownership and management of the setting is unclear.

It has the following strengths

- Behaviour is well managed. Children are helped to learn right from wrong and to care for each other and their environment.
- A well planned menu of nutritious meals and snacks helps promote children's health and well being.
- Children of all ages benefit from regular outdoor play in the nursery garden.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

Although the recently appointed manager has implemented some changes to help improve practice these are yet to be fully effective. For example, she has recently introduced systems for supervision and monitoring of staff. However, she does not yet have a clear overview of how well staff are performing and what action is needed to address weaknesses in their practice. The provider is in the process of reviewing policies and procedures. However, information about ownership and management of the setting is not made clear to parents and staff. This means that they do not always know who to direct concerns to. Safeguarding is not effective. Hazards that pose an immediate risk to children are not always reported or dealt with promptly. For example, on the day of inspection there was a cracked electric socket in the toddler's book area. Staff had failed to report this damage in line with the setting's maintenance procedures. As a result steps had not been taken to protect children from harm.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is inadequate

Staff do not effectively monitor and assess children's progress. They fail to routinely observe and record what children can do and where there are gaps in their learning. Regular newsletters help keep parents informed about what is happening at the nursery. However, parents state that are not given enough information about their own child's individual progress particularly in literacy and maths. Staff interact well with the children and make activities fun and engaging. For example, children laugh and eagerly join in a guessing game where they try to name objects stored in a 'magic box'. Staff ask questions to help the children develop their thinking and problem solving skills

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

The weaknesses in safeguarding compromise children's safety and welfare. This means that children's well-being cannot always be assured. Staff encourage children's positive behaviour and independence. For example, they remind the children to share and take turns and be kind to each other. They support children's growing independence as they encourage them to help tidy up and help serve themselves at mealtimes. All children enjoy daily outdoor play. Staff ensure children are suitably protected by providing sun hats and applying sun screen in line with parents wishes.

Outcomes for children are inadequate

Staff do not accurately observe or record what children can do in line with their expected development. As a result they do not always identify gaps in their learning. This means that not all children are provided with consistently challenging activities to help them make good progress.

Chatterbox House Day Nursery registered in 2002. The nursery is run by a limited company situated in a detached house in Sidcup, Kent. The nursery is open each weekday, from 7.30am to 6pm, all year round. This is with the exception of bank holidays and one week at Christmas. The provider receives funding for the provision of free early education for children aged three and four years. The provider employs a team of 15 staff, of whom 13 hold appropriate early years qualifications.

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
