Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has addressed the action set at her last inspection. She has reviewed her use of questions to allow children more time to respond and describes how she would set up the learning environment to support children's individual needs. The childminder is able to discuss how she plans to provide learning experiences based on children's interests and the next steps in their development.
- The childminder demonstrates through discussion a good understanding of how to support children to settle. She explains how she uses information gathered from parents to provide appropriate support for children when they first start in her care.
- The childminder has a good understanding of child protection and arrangements for safeguarding are effective. She has a good knowledge and understanding of the 'Prevent' duty guidance and the potential indicators that children may be at risk of being exposed to extreme behaviours or views.
- The childminder demonstrates a commitment to building effective links with parents and other professionals to meet the needs of children and their families. In addition, she explains the practices she would adopt to keep parents informed of their children's achievements.
- The childminder holds a current paediatric first-aid certificate and has an up-to-date knowledge of how to deal with accidents.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
