# Summary of key findings for parents

## This provision is good

- Staff offer a welcoming and interesting environment for children. The quality of staff coaching and instruction, particularly in helping children learn sports-based skills, is good. Children learn new skills, engage happily and behave very well.
- Children enjoy their time at the holiday club. They benefit from a range of activities, indoors and outdoors, and are confident to join in. They play cooperatively with their peers and the older children attending. Children have warm bonds with staff.
- Staff use the provider's policies, procedures and risk assessments closely to securely guide their practice, keep children safe and support their well-being.
- Staff establish partnerships with parents well. Parents are positive about the convenience of the club and how much children enjoy the activities offered. Staff value parental views. For example, following feedback, staff introduced new sessions such as 'Chillax' and drama classes to further children's enjoyment and opportunities for rest.

## It is not yet outstanding because:

- Staff do not find out as much as possible about what children want to do, to help them plan more effectively for their interests when they start and during their time at the setting.
- Staff sometimes miss opportunities to support children when starting new tasks, to help them consider their methods and test out their ideas about how to do things.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- extend the ways in which staff find out about what children's expectations are, to help plan more effectively for their interests
- provide more opportunities for children to independently test out their ideas when taking part in new topics, and make decisions about how to approach a task.

## **Inspection activities**

- The inspector observed staff interactions with children during activities indoors and outdoors.
- The inspector and the provider completed a joint observation. They spent time discussing how staff plan for children's activities.
- The inspector spoke with children and staff at appropriate times during the inspection. She read parental responses and took these into account.
- The inspector met with the provider and the manager. They discussed how staff evaluate the provision, support and develop staff practice.
- The inspector sampled the provider's documentation and children's records.

# **Inspection findings**

## Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The provider and manager lead their staff team well. They use efficient recruitment and induction procedures to ensure staff are suitable for their roles. The manager updates staff skills and knowledge through daily meetings and successful supervision. Safeguarding is effective. Staff complete all relevant safeguarding training and are aware of the guidance and legislation. For example, they confidently explain how to safeguard children, including a clear understanding of the procedures to follow to protect children against others' extreme views or behaviours. The provider and manager continuously reflect on the quality of the provision, including ways to improve and complement children's learning received in school and at home. Currently the manager's focus is on how staff utilise free-play resources, and is coaching to develop their skills for supporting children's chosen play. Staff have established useful partnerships with teaching staff at the school where the club is based.

## Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff know the children well overall and provide effectively to meet their individual needs. They adapt sports-based activities, such as hockey and badminton, so that children can take part alongside their older peers. Staff give clear instructions, reassurance and praise as children play. All children are confident, sociable, and demonstrate good levels of physical development. Staff encourage children to communicate well. Children show respect for each other by listening when others talk, and they ask for help if they need it, for example, when taking part in craft activities. During these sessions, staff build on children's mathematical and problem-solving skills. For example, they help children to plan as they purchase art resources from their make-believe budget. Later in the day, when staff make awards for the best crafts, children are proud of their efforts and respectfully congratulate their friends.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

All children demonstrate emotional security and understand the routines of the day. They take responsibility for their belongings and behave very well. Staff are warm and caring role models for children. They deploy themselves well. Staff give top priority to supervising children, for example, they use walkie-talkies to keep in contact so they know the whereabouts of children at all times. Staff are proactive in helping children to assess risk for themselves, such as during the daily group get-together, when children re-visit the club's Golden Guidelines. Children show independence as they recall some of these guidelines, including confidently stating, 'Nobody must let an adult in the front door'. Likewise, children show an understanding of the importance of not blocking fire doors with their bicycles or scooters, and of having fun and being kind to each other. All children have regular opportunities to be outdoors, benefiting from fresh air and opportunities to be active.
