Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Management and staff work well together. Their professional approach and inclusive practice provide a positive environment which helps to promote equal opportunities for all children.
- Children benefit from the variety of interesting and stimulating experiences. They are active learners and are engaged in what they are doing.
- Staff ensure that children are able to choose toys and resources and pursue their own interests. Children show they are motivated to learn.
- Parents and carers are provided with regular updates about their children's progress. They speak positively about the nursery.
- Children are happy, content and show a good sense of security. Staff are kind, warm and welcoming. Overall, they support children's emotional well-being effectively and are good role models for children.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- Staff do not make the best use of their assessments to help monitor children's learning as precisely as possible from the start, to support children to make more rapid progress in all aspects.
- Staff do not use children's own contributions fully to help further promote children's confidence and self-worth.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- make even better use of assessments so that children's learning and developmental progress are clear and targeted right from the start
- support children's self-esteem and confidence even further by finding more opportunities to celebrate their work and achievements.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the staff teaching practice during children's play inside and outside.
- The inspector spoke to staff, children and parents and took account of their views.
- The inspector sampled the nursery's policies, documents and children's records.
- The inspector held discussions with the management team.
- The inspector discussed the nursery's self-evaluation processes and plans for future improvement.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. Staff have a secure understanding of their responsibility to protect children. They know whom to report to should they have any concerns. Leaders and staff use effective risk assessment processes to keep children safe. Staff are able to access training to enrich their professional development. For example, they attend company conferences to inform them about new ideas to help engage children further and help them learn in more exciting ways. Staff establish partnerships with other professionals, particularly to help children who need additional support in their development. Overall, the management team uses self-evaluation effectively to identify the nursery's strengths and areas for development. For example, managers are looking at improving the range of activities children have available when they arrive at the nursery in the morning.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff plan activities to provide focused play to meet children's interests and individual learning needs. For example, for three-year-old children staff freeze toy dinosaurs to create an ice exterior and children actively try different ways to get through the ice. Children demonstrate good listening skills and show they thoroughly enjoy this activity. Older children have opportunities to develop their writing and number skills. For instance, they learn to recognise and write the letters of their name. Staff encourage counting, adding and taking away as children role play shops, for example. Babies have plenty of space in which to crawl and learn to walk. They are able to explore messy play, such as paint and water. There are also challenging activities, such as wooden building blocks and shape sorters. These experiences all help to encourage the youngest children to experiment with new resources.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Staff encourage children to be independent. For example, children at 10 months old sit at a table to have their lunch, and many of them are capable of using a spoon well to feed themselves. Staff use the outdoor area every day, for example, older children love to go outdoors at the end of a huge downpour, splashing in puddles. Children develop an awareness of how to keep themselves safe; for instance, they regularly practise the emergency evacuation procedure. Children leaving to go on to another setting are emotionally prepared for this change. They talk to staff about what they might do there. Children learn about eating healthily, for example, they have balanced, freshly cooked meals, with new foods to try regularly.

Outcomes for children are good

Children make good progress in their learning. They gain the necessary skills in readiness for school. Staff work closely with parents and provide suggestions for home learning. This helps provide consistency to help children understand what is expected of them.

South Bermondsey Community Nursery registered in 2016 and operates from South Bermondsey Children's Centre in London. It is owned by The London Early Years Foundation company, which also owns another 38 nurseries. The nursery is open from Monday to Friday, 8am to 6pm, for most of the year. It closes on bank holidays and for a few days at Christmas. The nursery is in receipt of funding for two-, three- and four-yearold children. The nursery employs 12 members of staff, of whom 11 hold relevant early years qualifications.

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
