Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is outstanding

- Partnerships with parents are highly effective. There is an extensive range of information that is given to parents to keep them extremely well informed about the club. Parents state they are very happy with the care and wide range of learning opportunities provided. Some parents comment they feel staff are like family as their children attend the club for many years.
- Children behave exceptionally well. They work very cooperatively together. Children are very supportive of each other and eagerly make the most of opportunities to help one another during activities.
- The management team frequently evaluates their practice. They quickly identify areas that can be even further developed. The important views of parents and children are fully incorporated into planned changes and adaptations to the excellent practice provided.
- Children settle very quickly in the club. Key staff fully support their needs and skilfully promote their confidence with consistent praise and encouragement. Children are very eager to share their views and ideas, which are fully included and contribute to the planning of activities.
- The management team has a very robust supervision process for all staff. They receive frequent observations from senior staff and are provided with high-quality feedback that enables them to strengthen and improve their practice.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

continue to maintain the high-quality staff interactions with children that support and extend their play experiences.

- The inspector observed the activities indoors and outdoors and the interactions between staff and children.
- The inspector talked to staff and children at appropriate times during the inspection.
- The inspector held a meeting with the early years manager, area manager and the club manager.
- The inspector spoke to a number of parents during the inspection and took account of their views.
- The inspector carried out a discussion with the early years manager about an activity.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is outstanding

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. The club places children's safety and welfare at the heart of all they do. Staff have an excellent knowledge of the signs and symptoms of abuse. They know the club's procedures to follow and who to contact in their local authority. All staff attend safeguarding training before they start working for the summer or Easter period with the club. This training is enhanced even further when staff start on site at the beginning of each season. Staff have a very robust and extensive registration process which ensures that they know at all times who is at the club at any given time. Only authorised adults with the correct password for that day and collection fob are able to collect the children from camp, which further promotes the high priority for children's safety. Staff have an extensive range of training opportunities for their professional development that they readily undertake to enhance and strengthen their skills and practice. The management team recognises the importance of continuing to maintain staff's excellent practice that extend children's play experiences. Parents comment that staff are highly approachable and friendly.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is outstanding

Children receive excellent support from dedicated staff. They provide detailed guidance for children to fully promote their independence during all activities. This helps children to fully engage, stay focused and try things for themselves. Staff skilfully challenge children and asks questions to support them working out for themselves what a clue means while they look for 'Billy the Fish' around the extensive grounds of the club. Children are given a very wide range of resources and time to create and explore their own ideas. They delight in sharing their achievements of the masks they have created with their friends and staff. Children are given a wealth of opportunities to extend their writing and literacy skills, for example, through writing their own name and finding the letters of their name from cereal, placing them in the correct order to spell it out. Children delight in discussing a wide variety of trees. They excitedly recall where each tree grows in the world and what grows on the tree, including conkers and apples.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are outstanding

Staff spend time talking with the children about their day. This is highly effective in supporting children to feel an important part of the club. It provides children with many opportunities to share any worries, concerns and achievements with staff. Staff promote children's understanding about living a healthy lifestyle extremely effectively. They have detailed discussions with them during mealtimes where children's knowledge is sought about what food is good for them. They talk about different food that children eat from many different cultures. Staff are excellent positive role models for the children. Children eagerly tidy away activities at the end of each session to the tidy-up-time song. They fully understand the importance of having excellent hygiene practices and talk about how they wash the germs away with soap before eating. Children are provided with extensive opportunities to develop their physical skills. They enjoy riding motorised cars, taking part in dance activities and trying to shoot a goal during ball games.

The club opens from Monday to Friday during the Easter holidays and for four weeks of the summer holidays. Sessions are from 8.30am until 5.30pm with an extended day from 8am until 6pm.
