## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder knows how to assess, plan and support children's learning to help them make progress in all areas of learning and development. She intends to use her assessments to check children's progress and identify any gaps in learning.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working in partnerships with parents and other settings that children attend. She knows to provide regular feedback to parents.
- The childminder has attended safeguarding training and is able to protect children and keep them safe. She knows what to do if she has concerns about their welfare.
- The childminder understands the need to evaluate the service she provides, to help her to identify strengths and areas for development.
- The childminder understands how to manage children's behaviour positively. She gives examples of how she plans to support children to respect and value each other's opinions and cultures.
- The childminder knows the importance of providing daily opportunities for children to have physical exercise and maintain a healthy lifestyle.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver the educational programmes for children and undertake observation, assessment and planning.
- The inspector looked around the home that will be used for childminding.
- The inspector discussed the childminder's methods for evaluating the quality of her provision.
- The inspector looked at relevant documentation and saw evidence of the suitability of the childminder and other adults living at the premises.
- The inspector discussed the safeguarding and welfare requirements with the childminder.

The childminder registered in 2010. She lives in the London Borough of Southwark and works with two co-childminders. She works all year round, Monday to Friday, 7.30am to 8pm. She holds an appropriate early years qualification at level 3.
