Summary of key findings for parents

This provision requires improvement. It is not yet good because:

- The childminder does not provide sufficient opportunities to support her assistants, in order to develop their knowledge and expertise in working with young children.
- The childminder does not consistently complete a short, written summary of children's development between the ages of two and three years to share with parents.
- Children are not given enough suitable challenges in activities and resources provided to help them develop as confident and motivated learners.
- The childminder does not effectively evaluate her practice to identify how to improve standards over time.

It has the following strengths

- Children behave well and demonstrate that they feel safe and happy in the childminder's setting.
- The childminder praises children's efforts which supports their well-being and confidence.
- The childminder forms good partnerships with parents. She asks for their views to help her provide a service that meets their individual needs.
- Children learn about similarities and differences between themselves and others.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage the provider must:

Due Date

- implement regular opportunities for the supervision of assistants to 04/09/2017 support them in improving their practice in order to improve outcomes for all children
- ensure all parents receive a short written summary of their child's 04/09/2017 development between the ages of two and three years
- improve the quality of teaching and resources so every child enjoys 04/09/2017 suitable levels of challenge in their play and learning.

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

make effective use of self-evaluation to identify and prioritise future improvements to provision, to ensure knowledge is current and strongly focused on improving the quality of teaching.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the childminder's interactions with the children and the impact this has upon their learning and development.
- The inspector spoke to a few parents during the inspection.
- The inspector completed a joint observation with the childminder and discussed how she evaluates her provision.
- The inspector observed and spoke to the children as they played.
- The inspector looked at a range of documentation, including children's assessment records, policies and procedures.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management requires improvement

The childminder does not thoroughly evaluate the quality of her provision in order to raise standards and improve outcomes for children. She has not implemented effective supervision arrangements for her assistants to help them develop their practice. Safeguarding is effective. The childminder is confident in identifying possible signs of abuse or neglect and the actions to take if she has any concerns. Her home is secure and she makes regular checks to ensure the safety of children. The childminder works in partnership with other settings that children attend to share relevant information. This provides children with consistency and continuity in their care and learning.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment requires improvement

The quality of teaching is inconsistent. Children have time to initiate their own play but the childminder does not always support this effectively. She focuses on finding out what children already know, for example, their counting skills. However, she does not always use the information to extend or enhance their learning further. The childminder observes children to find out what interests them. She provides some appropriate resources to help them follow their interests, such as, toy cars or construction equipment. Parents are asked about their children's learning and interests when they start attending. The childminder continues to involve parents through sharing information between home and her setting.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare require improvement

The childminder supports children's understanding of the importance of healthy lifestyles. They enjoy a good range of snacks and daily opportunities outside for exercise and fresh air. The children have access to resources but they do not always motivate and challenge children. This has an effect on children's levels of involvement in their learning. The childminder takes children on outings to learn about the local area. She plans activities to help them learn about the world beyond their immediate community. Parents' comments made during the inspection were very positive about the levels of care given to their children.

Outcomes for children require improvement

The quality of teaching is not consistently strong enough to enable every child to make good progress overall. However, children develop some skills that support them for their future learning and as they move to school. Older children acquire early writing skills and recognise familiar words. Children show independence in their self-care skills and know the importance of handwashing at appropriate times. They develop social skills and know it is important to share popular resources.
