Summary of key findings for parents

The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder has not kept up to date with her knowledge of safeguarding requirements, for example, she is unaware of her duty to prevent children from being drawn into situations which put them at significant risk of harm. This compromises the welfare and safety of children in her care. This is also a breach of the childcare register requirements.
- The childminder has not addressed actions set at her last inspection. She is not confident about how to plan and provide a wide range of experiences to support young children in all areas of learning and development.
- The childminder understands the importance of developing strong partnerships with parents right from the start.
- The childminder holds a current paediatric first-aid qualification and knows how to respond to accidents. She knows that she needs to inform parents of any accidents or injuries that children sustain while in her care.
- The childminder has an awareness of how to support children with their health and self-care skills to help them become increasingly independent. She knows how to encourage children's good behaviour.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and the Childcare Register the provider must:
