Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- The childminder regularly cares for more young children than ratio requirements allow. Children are not adequately supervised and the childminder shows a limited understanding of the dangers this may have on children's safety and well-being.
- The childminder does not have a suitable understanding of her role and responsibilities in regard to safeguarding children. She is not aware of who to contact should she have a child protection concern or the importance of recording any concerns raised.
- The childminder has failed to notify Ofsted that that she has worked alongside another adult, whose suitability has not been checked, on at least one occasion.
- The childminder's risk assessment processes are not effective. She does not recognise hazards in her home or take reasonable steps to keep children safe.
- The childminder does not manage children's behaviour consistently. Children are not given sufficient opportunities to learn how to manage their own behaviour.
- The childminder's interactions with the children are weak. The quality of teaching is poor and the childminder does not recognise most opportunities to extend children's learning. She fails to focus her support to meet children's individual needs and ensure they are progressing and developing key skills. Children do not make the progress of which they are capable.

It has the following strengths

Overall, the childminder has positive relationships with the children. They arrive happily and enjoy being in her care.

Inspection activities

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

The childminder regularly cares for more young children than she is allowed and fails to meet their needs. Children are not adequately supervised, for example, a young child was left alone in the kitchen for a long period while eating. The childminder shows limited understanding of the detrimental effects poor supervision has on children's safety and well-being. Despite recent training, the qualified childminder has failed to keep up to date with current guidance to support children effectively. Safeguarding is ineffective. The childminder has some understanding of signs that may cause her concern about a child's welfare. However, she has a poor knowledge of the processes to follow to ensure children are fully protected. The childminder sometimes invites other adults to help her care for children, but does not take appropriate steps to determine their suitability. Some self-evaluation takes place and the childminder gathers the views of parents. However, this process is not rigorous enough to identify the significant weaknesses in practice.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is inadequate

The childminder has a poor understanding of how children learn and of her role in supporting their development. The organisation and delivery of activities does not promote children's learning well or capture their interest. For example, during a leaf printing activity, the childminder allowed each child one leaf, a small amount of paint and instructed how they should place the painted leaf on the paper. She did not give children the opportunity to explore their creative and investigative skills. The childminder does not recognise when to intervene to extend children's learning. There are extended periods where no interaction takes place. The childminder does not use effective methods to support children's communication and language skills or their mathematical understanding. The childminder does not understand how to adapt activities to reflect the needs of children of different ages. For example, while the childminder focused on older children, younger children were not occupied and became unsettled. The childminder observes and monitors children's learning and recognises gaps in their development. However, she does not use this information to plan or lead activities to match their learning needs.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

The childminder does not ensure children have a safe place to play and does not manage risks effectively. For example, she was unaware that a young child was playing unsupervised near a hot oven. The childminder does not have a suitable arrangement to supervise all children effectively while they play in the garden. The limited amount of space means that the garden cannot be used by all children together. The childminder is unable to observe and ensure the safety of the children who are playing indoors and those playing outdoors at the same time. The childminder does not consistently use effective ways to help children learn how to behave. She does not manage situations well to ensure children understand her expectations and the impact that their behaviour can have on others. Children are keen to come to see the childminder and welcome her cuddles. They freely explore the resources available and develop appropriate hygiene routines. For example, they wash their hands before enjoying a healthy meal.

Outcomes for children are inadequate

Children do not make adequate progress in their learning and development. At times, they become unsettled and display some unwanted behaviour. Children are friendly and polite, but they do not gain the best possible support to develop good social skills. Children do not gain the skills to become independent, motivated learners and are not prepared well for their future move on to school.
