The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has addressed the actions set at the last inspection. The childminder is aware of the need to evaluate her practice and her training needs to drive continuous improvement.
- The childminder has a good understanding of how to work in partnership with parents and other providers to meet children's learning needs.
- The childminder understands the learning and development requirements. She knows the importance of providing appropriate challenge, to help children make progress.
- The childminder understands the need to teach children how to behave well and to promote their awareness of equality and diversity.
- The childminder is fully aware of her responsibilities to meet the safeguarding and welfare requirements. She knows the action to take if she had a concern about a child.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's good health and well-being. She knows how to plan healthy meals and help children learn good hygiene routines.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector viewed areas of the home used for childminding. She talked with the childminder about resources and the equipment used, and looked at some of these.
- The inspector viewed documents with regards to the qualifications of the childminder and suitability of those living in the household.
- The inspector discussed the self-evaluation process for improving practice.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver the educational programmes for children and how she will undertake observations, assessments and planning.
- The inspector looked at documentation and a selection of policies and procedures the childminder will use when caring for children.

The childminder registered in 2004 and lives in Hucknall, Nottingham. She operates from 7.30am until 9am and 3pm until 5pm, Monday to Thursday, and from 7.30am until 9am on Friday, all year round, except for bank holidays and family holidays. The childminder holds a childcare qualification at level 3.
