Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder demonstrates a sound understanding of her responsibility to safeguard children. She is knowledgeable about child protection issues and what to do if she has any concerns. She knows how to provide a safe environment for children and to manage accidents and the administration of medication.
- The childminder understands how to support children's learning and development. She explains how she will observe children's learning and use this information to identify what they need to learn next. She describes how she will plan an appropriate range of activities that help children to progress and take into account their interests.
- The childminder knows how to build effective partnerships with parents and other settings that children attend. She understands the benefits of consistency for children and offers an inclusive service.
- The childminder seeks feedback from parents to help her to identify improvements to her setting. She encourages children's views and suggestions and describes how she supports them to work together to make decisions, for example, to plan future activities.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector viewed areas of the premises used for childminding.
- The inspector discussed the learning and development requirements with the childminder, and how she will plan for and observe and assess children's learning.
- The inspector discussed the safeguarding and welfare requirements with the childminder and checked evidence of adults living on the premises.
- The inspector looked at relevant documentation, such as policies and evidence of training.
- The inspector took account of recent feedback from parents.

The childminder registered in 2002 and lives in Coton-in-the-Elms, Derbyshire. She operates all year round from 7.30am to 5.30pm, Monday to Friday, except for bank holidays and family holidays. The childminder holds a relevant qualification at level 5.
