## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder does not have a secure knowledge and understanding of current safeguarding procedures and guidance. She does not know how to identify and respond to concerns about children being exposed to extreme ideas, views or behaviour.
- The childminder has a secure understanding of how to use observation and assessment to promote and monitor children's progress, and challenge their learning and development.
- The childminder understands the importance of providing varied activities and experiences to help children develop the skills they need for starting school.
- The childminder has a clear understanding of how to promote children's health. For example, by encouraging them to eat nutritious snacks and meals.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents and other agencies to meet children's individual needs.
- The childminder understands how to evaluate and continuously improve her teaching practice, and children's care and learning.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## What the setting needs to do to improve further

**To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage the provider must:**

- improve knowledge of Local Safeguarding Children Board procedures and keep this knowledge up to date, including government guidance on how to identify and respond to concerns about children being exposed to extreme ideas, views or behaviour.
