## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder recognises the importance of self-evaluation. She knows where to seek advice and support to improve her practice and outcomes for children.
- The childminder understands her role in keeping children safe. She knows where to raise her concerns about a child's welfare and the reporting procedures to follow.
- The childminder knows how to support children's learning and development, and to help them make good progress. She knows how to support children's emotional well-being and help to prepare children for the next stages in their learning.
- The childminder knows how to encourage children to enjoy healthy lifestyles and promote their physical well-being. For example, she understands how to help children make healthy eating choices and enjoy regular outings, such as to local parks.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents and other professionals to support children's individual needs.
- The childminder understands the importance of keeping children safe and from harm. She regularly completes risk assessments of her home and has an appropriate paediatric first-aid certificate.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector had a tour of the premises with the childminder and viewed the areas normally used for childminding purposes.
- The inspector spoke to the childminder about her understanding of the legal requirements, including how she will support children's learning and development.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder the daily activities and resources she would provide for children of different ages.
- The inspector viewed documentation, such as the childminder's paediatric first-aid qualification and liability insurance certificate.
