Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder describes how she will help children to develop skills in readiness for school. She describes how she will use everyday opportunities, such as counting the buttons on children's coats, to help develop their number skills.
- The childminder demonstrates how she will work with parents to support children's learning. She talks about the information she will acquire from them when children start attending, in order to plan activities that reflect children's stage of development.
- The childminder describes how she will help children to settle into her home and develop relationships with her. Settling-in procedures, such as coming for short visits with their parents and building up the time they stay on their own, will be offered.
- The childminder has a very good understanding of child protection issues. She is aware of the signs and symptoms that may indicate possible abuse to children and knows how to report any concerns she may have about a child in her care.
- The childminder describes how she intends to extend her professional knowledge further and how this helps her identify areas where she could improve her practice.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
