Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- The provider, who is also the manager and the designated safeguarding officer, does not have a thorough knowledge and understanding of safeguarding policy and procedures. She is unaware of the correct action to take when an allegation is made against a member of staff.
- Some staff do not have sufficient knowledge of child protection matters. Some do not understand the indicators that a child may be at risk of harm and/or exposed to extreme views. Some staff do not know or understand the procedures relating to allegations against other staff members.
- The recruitment procedures do not ensure all adults employed are suitable to work with children. Staff are not vigilant enough to keep children safe at all times.
- The key person arrangements are not effective. They do not meet the children's individual needs. Key persons do not maintain effective two-way communication with parents to maintain consistency of care and learning.
- Some staff do not ensure children receive clear messages about acceptable behaviour. The nursery's behaviour management policy does not reflect the behaviour management methods used in practice. This means parents do not know the strategies the nursery is using.
- The management is weak. The manager does not act promptly to offer effective coaching and support to staff to help them improve the quality of their teaching.
- The quality of teaching is variable. Some staff do not know how to observe and assess children's learning effectively. Children do not always receive timely support.

It has the following strengths

Children enjoy healthy food and opportunities to freely play indoors and outside.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

The provider, who is also the manager, does not meet all requirements for the early years foundation stage and the relevant Childcare Register. Safeguarding is ineffective. The manager does not ensure all staff have sufficient knowledge of the signs that a child might be at risk or what actions to take should a child be in need of protection. As the designated safeguarding officer, the manager does not know the correct procedures to follow if an allegation was made against a member of staff. These weaknesses compromise children's welfare. Although all staff undertake the required Disclosure and Barring Service check, the manager does not follow other recruitment procedures thoroughly to ensure all adults employed are suitable to work with children. The management team does not monitor the guality of practice effectively to identify breaches in requirements and drive improvement. Although supervision arrangements are in place, the manager does not identify the variations in staff's teaching skills. She does not monitor their use of observations and assessments sufficiently to ensure all children make expected progress. Self-evaluation is weak. The management team has failed to identify and address all current weaknesses and breaches in the requirements. Parents provide positive feedback about the nursery.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment requires improvement

Overall, the manager and staff deliver a suitable range of interesting activities, indoors and outside, which children enjoy. However, the quality of teaching is not consistently good. Children learn to think for themselves and develop their memory. For example, they enjoy taking part in memory games and guess what object is missing. However, some staff miss opportunities to effectively engage with children to meet their different needs and abilities. For example, some staff do not encourage younger or quieter children to engage in conversations during activities and some staff do not know how to use effective questioning to extend children's learning.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Children's welfare is compromised due to the weaknesses in safeguarding. Moreover, staff are not vigilant enough to keep children safe and healthy. For example, during the inspection, staff did not see when a child hit another child with a toy. They did not notice that some children were drinking water from each other's bottles. This does not support children's health and spreads cross-infection. However, staff and the manager took appropriate action as soon as they became aware of such incidents. Although a key person system is in place, it is not fully effective yet. For example, some staff do not pay attention to their key children's individual needs, particularly those children that are new to the setting. Information is not shared routinely with parents to support children's development. However, staff do gather information about babies' care routines from the parents and share this with each other. Staff's management of children's behaviour is variable. They do not always explain to the children why some behaviours are not acceptable and the consequences of such behaviours. Moreover, the strategies used are not reflected in the nursery's policy that is shared with parents. This means that parents are not aware of behaviour management strategies used in the nursery. Overall, children gain skills needed for their next steps and eventual move to school. For example, older children learn how to recognise and write their names, letters and numbers. Children learn how to concentrate and become independent. However, outcomes for all children are not consistently good. For example, staff do not act promptly enough to gain help and support from other agencies when gaps in children's learning and development are identified.
