Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Staff plan a broad range of activities to match the children's interests and learning priorities. They make good use of group times to encourage children's communication and language skills.
- The manager regularly monitors children's development, which helps her to identify and address gaps in learning. Children make good progress.
- Accurate observations and assessments of children's learning are shared regularly with parents and other professionals. Parents feel well informed and comment positively on the opportunities given to discuss and support their children's development.
- The manager's self-evaluation is accurate and includes the views of others. For example, the manager consistently reviews and maintains records to keep children safe.
- Children are learning to respect each other's differences and learn about other cultures. For example, they search for numbers on a Chinese calendar and talk excitedly about their plans to celebrate the Chinese New Year with their parents at the setting.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- Staff do not explore different ways to gain detailed information from parents about children's achievements at home to enable them to plan more effectively.
- Children who prefer to play and learn outdoors do not have consistent opportunities to develop their literacy skills.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- explore further ways to involve parents in sharing their children's learning and achievements at home to help staff precisely target individual planning
- provide more opportunities for children who prefer to play and learn outdoors to develop their literacy skills.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed children's activities and the staff interacting with them, inside and outside.
- The inspector talked to staff about children's activities, their progress and how they are kept safe.
- The inspector looked at a sample of documents, which included the safeguarding policy and children's progress records.
- The inspector spoke to parents and considered their views.
- The inspector carried out a joint observation with the manager.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The manager provides a welcoming and safe environment. She effectively assesses risks to children. For example, she considers that children may slip on wet surfaces when they gather outside while they practise evacuating the setting. The manager is able to act quickly and reflect on procedures to keep children safe. Safeguarding is effective. Staff demonstrate a secure knowledge of child protection policies and confidently explain what to do if they are concerned about a child's safety or well-being. The manager identifies individual training needs to enhance staff's knowledge. For example, staff use a variety of puppets to support children's speech and language. The manager oversees observations and assessments of children's progress and compares the development of different groups of children to successfully plan for them. For example, the manager considers bonds younger children have built with their peers when they move to less familiar environments within the setting. This helps to ensure that children are emotionally well prepared for their next stage of learning.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff support children's mathematical development well. They encourage children to match shapes as they solve puzzles. Staff praise children for their efforts and challenge them further to name shapes to build on their existing knowledge. The well-qualified staff use a range of exciting activities to motivate children to join in. For example, children are keen to explore the contents of a bag introduced at group time. Staff skilfully encourage children to use their imagination as they help them to explore the contents. Children listen well and are inquisitive, such as when staff drop the 'bath bomb' into water. They show amazement as different colours emerge. Children use language such as 'gritty' when they feel the water and talk about the different colours they see.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Staff are good role models. They promote good listening skills and encourage children to consider how others feel if they are not listened to. Children listen well to each other and they feel safe in the well-planned environment. They form secure relationships with their peers and thrive on the daily routines. For example, babies join in actions as staff sing familiar rhymes. Children work together to build camps and enjoy using their muscles to pull on rope they find. Staff supervise this well and remind children that they need to be mindful of others as they move each other in different directions. This encourages children to use their muscles and move around safely.

Outcomes for children are good

Older children can find their coats and succeed in putting them on. Children make their own choices and select from a range of healthy snacks. They decide what activities they want to take part in and show confidence as they try new skills. Children learn to take turns and listen well to instructions. They make good progress in their readiness for school.
