## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands her responsibility to safeguard children. She attends regular training and is confident in recognising signs and symptoms of abuse. She knows the procedures to follow should she have concerns about children's welfare.
- The childminder demonstrates a good understanding of how to promote children's learning and development through interesting play opportunities. She understands how to observe and assess children's development to support their next stage of learning.
- The childminder recognises the need to work in close partnership with parents and other professionals to help provide support and continuity in children's learning.
- The childminder understands the importance of monitoring her own practice to ensure she is able to consistently meet children's needs.
- The childminder understands the benefits of helping children to lead a healthy lifestyle through eating healthy foods, playing outdoors and participating in physical exercise.
- Appropriate steps are taken to ensure children play in a safe and suitable environment. The childminder holds public liability insurance and a valid first-aid qualification.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
