Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder knows the procedures to follow should she have concerns about children. She keeps up to date with changes in safeguarding procedures.
- The childminder provides a stimulating environment with a vast selection of age-appropriate toys and resources. The childminder carries out regular risk assessments to ensure the premises are in a suitable condition at all times.
- The childminder demonstrates that she has a good understanding of how to promote children's good health. She is aware of the importance of physical exercise and effective hygiene practices as part of the daily routine to meet children's needs.
- The childminder demonstrates a good understanding of what children need to make good progress. She knows how to observe, assess and plan for children's learning.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnerships with parents and other providers to ensure children receive the support they need for their learning. She maintains her professional development and is aware of reviewing her practice regularly as part of the self-evaluation process.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to observe and plan for children's learning. She discussed how she would work with parents to promote their children's learning.
- The inspector carried out a tour of the premises, and observed the range of resources available for children's learning and play.
- The inspector discussed self-evaluation and the childminder's understanding of reviewing her practice regularly.
- The inspector discussed healthcare routines with the childminder.
- The inspector looked at relevant documents the childminder might use for the smooth running of her provision.

The childminder registered in 2010. She lives in Winslow in Buckinghamshire. The childminder operates all year round, from 7.30am to 5.30pm from Monday to Friday, except for family holidays. The childminder offers funded early education for children aged two, three and four years. The childminder holds a qualification at level 3.
