## Summary of key findings for parents

#### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has responded positively to the actions raised at her last inspection. As a result she has noticeably improved the quality of the care and learning she provides for children.
- The childminder demonstrates a commitment to improve further the quality of her provision. She receives regular support visits from the early years local authority advisor and is undertaking further training.
- The premises are safe and suitable for children both indoors and outdoors. Children are well supervised and the dog is separated from them at all times.
- The childminder has built up her resources to provide the children with more challenge and variety.
- The childminder's knowledge and understanding of the learning and development requirements has increased. As a result, she is more able to provide activities that promote children's learning and help them progress.
- Safeguarding is effective. The childminder knows the correct procedures to follow if she has a child protection concern or if an allegation is made against herself or a family member.
- Children's awareness of healthy eating is well promoted. The childminder helps children to learn about food by encouraging them to grow fruits and vegetables on the family allotment.
- The childminder is actively building up a two-way exchange of information with the school the children attend in order to effectively promote their learning.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
