# Summary of key findings for parents

## This provision is good

- Staff provide children with excellent opportunities to explore their surroundings and to be physically active. They effectively promote children's understanding of the world around them. For instance, staff take children on regular exciting outings, including trips to nearby country parks, woods and the beach.
- Children are provided with healthy options during mealtimes. Staff promote good hygiene practices. They talk to children about why it is important to ensure they wash their hands and get rid of germs. This helps to promote children's understanding of the importance of being healthy.
- Staff work closely with other early years providers and schools where children attend. They share information regarding children's learning and development needs. Staff liaise with teachers and arrange robust settling-in sessions when children start school. This helps to promote children's emotional well-being.
- Children demonstrate good communication skills. They fully participate in conversations. Children show interest and enthusiasm in their response to questions asked.

## It is not yet outstanding because:

- Leaders have not identified ways to target specific training needs for staff through highly effective performance management systems that help raise teaching skills.
- Leaders have not fully established precise monitoring systems that help to identify any possible emerging gaps in children's learning.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

## To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- embed precise performance management procedures and accurately identify specific training needs for staff that help to raise the quality of teaching
- refine the already good ways to monitor children's progress to identify any possible emerging gaps in their learning.

#### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and outdoors, and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector spoke with staff and children during the inspection.
- The inspector completed a joint observation with the senior nursery officer.
- The inspector held a meeting with the manager. She looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of staff working in the nursery.
- The inspector took into account the views of parents through written feedback provided.

# **Inspection findings**

## Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. Leaders have implemented detailed child protection policies and ensure staff have a good understanding of local safeguarding procedures. Staff provide excellent opportunities for children to develop an understanding of how to keep themselves safe. For instance, they remind children about their dog safety rules, including holding up their hands when walking past dogs. Children are fully involved in all aspects of identifying and thinking of different ways to address hazards in their environment. Children demonstrate an excellent understanding of rules and boundaries within the setting. Leaders review the overall quality of the provision. They listen and value the views of others in helping them to identify and address areas of development.

# Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Teaching is good and in some instances is outstanding. The well-qualified staff, particularly in the pre-school room, offer superb opportunities for children to learn about animals, plants and features of the outdoor environment. They demonstrate high levels of enthusiasm and use excellent questioning techniques that help children to develop their thinking skills. Children delight in discovering woodland animals, including squirrels. They learn about the different foods animals eat. This helps to develop children's understanding of how to care for other living things. Staff complete observations and assessments of children's learning well, overall. Parents have access to their children's learning records through a secure online learning portal. They are complimentary about the setting and the quality of care staff provide for their children.

## Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children behave well. They are confident and form strong friendship groups. Good relationships between staff promote positive interactions. Staff are caring and friendly. Children settle in well. Staff complete daily checks and regular risk assessments. This includes ensuring toys, resources and outdoor equipment are clean and hygienic. This helps to ensure that the environment is safe for children. Children develop good levels of independence. They manage their self-care needs well and learn to put on their own coat and shoes ready for outdoor play.

#### **Outcomes for children are good**

Children make good progress. They demonstrate excellent mathematical skills. Children use measuring equipment and make comparisons between different objects they find during nature walks. Younger children act out their favourite stories. This involves them stomping through squelching mud during a trip through the woods. Children recognise shapes and talk about patterns they see in their environment. They are well equipped with the key skills needed for future learning and their eventual move to school.
