## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder does not hold a current first-aid qualification as required.
- The childminder has not kept up to date with changes in safeguarding practice, in particular, her responsibility to recognise the signs of female genital mutilation. However, she is aware of the signs and symptoms of other abuse and how to report it.
- The childminder knows how to plan activities for children across all areas of learning. She discusses the importance of meeting children's individual needs and monitoring their progress, closing any emerging gaps if they arise. Furthermore, she understands how to prepare children to be ready for school.
- The childminder understands the importance of creating positive partnerships with parents and other settings children attend to share and complement children's learning.
- The childminder knows how to how to manage children's behaviour. She discusses using praise and supporting children to understand the rules and boundaries in the setting.
- The childminder discusses evaluating her practice. She has clear priorities for improvement.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## What the setting needs to do to improve further

**To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and the Childcare Register the provider must:**

The childminder registered in 2015 and lives in York. She operates all year round from 7.30am to 6pm, Monday to Friday, except bank holidays and family holidays. The childminder holds an appropriate qualification at level 3.
