## Summary of key findings for parents

## This provision requires improvement. It is not yet good because:

- Systems for the effective monitoring and supervision of staff are still in their infancy. Staff are not fully supported to understand the responsibilities of their role and improve the quality of their teaching.
- The quality of teaching is variable within the nursery. Staff do not consistently provide experiences that challenge children and extend their learning. As a result, children do not always make the best possible progress in their learning.
- Children's development is assessed at regular intervals. However, some of the assessments are not accurate. Consequently, emerging gaps in children's achievement are not always identified swiftly.

## It has the following strengths

- The management team is well qualified and is extremely keen to improve practice within the nursery. It is working closely with the local authority and has identified a clear action plan that identifies key priorities with realistic targets to make improvements.
- Staff are caring, kind and calm in their approach. They have developed close relationships with the children. This helps children to feel safe and secure in the nursery and supports their emotional well-being.
- Children have a range of opportunities to learn about the wider world. Staff embrace the different backgrounds of families and children.

# **Inspection findings**

## Effectiveness of the leadership and management requires improvement

The management team has a generally accurate overview of the effectiveness of the nursery. It demonstrates a positive desire to improve the overall quality of teaching and the achievements of all children. However, it is too early to demonstrate the impact this is having on improving outcomes for children. The management team has developed some systems to provide training for staff and monitor their performance. However, these are not rigorous enough to support staff to fully understand the responsibilities of their role and improve the quality of their teaching. The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. Staff are aware of their responsibility to protect children from harm and know the local procedures to follow if they are concerned about a child. The provider implements effective recruitment processes. This helps to ensure that all staff are suitable to work with children. Feedback from parents is positive.

## Quality of teaching, learning and assessment requires improvement

Staff are not sufficiently skilled to ensure that all children progress in their learning during activities. They do not skilfully engage all children to ensure they get the most from their learning experiences. For example, some staff do not wait for children to respond to a question and are too quick to answer for them. More skilful staff lead by example and model better quality teaching, and children benefit from these interactions. For instance, children enjoy listening to their favourite stories and talking about what might happen next.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children are happy. Staff have a caring approach and are sensitive to children's individual needs. This means that children settle quickly into the nursery and that their emotional well-being is well supported. Children have good opportunities to learn about the importance of healthy lifestyles. They talk about the food that is good for them at mealtimes. They know about handwashing before meals and are as independent as possible, according to their stage of development. This helps to promote their physical health and well-being effectively. Behaviour throughout the nursery is good. Staff are effective role models and share consistent expectations. Complying with these expectations helps children enjoy their nursery experiences and have some emerging skills to underpin their eventual move to school.

#### **Outcomes for children require improvement**

Overall, children generally reach typical levels of development and older children gain basic skills to help prepare them for school. However, some assessments are not accurate. This means that the information on children's learning and development is too unreliable to have a clear and accurate view of children's progress. The pre-school children's pencil control is developing well. They are learning about the link between letters and the sounds they represent.
