## Summary of key findings for parents

## This provision is good

- Children demonstrate that they feel very happy and confident in this welcoming preschool. They form warm and secure bonds with their key person and all members of staff. For instance, children welcome staff's sensitive interaction in their play and frequently give them a cuddle.
- The dedicated and well-qualified staff continue to update their knowledge and skills. They receive regular supervisory meetings and have good training opportunities. Recent training has enhanced staff knowledge of improving the provision for two-year-old children even further. Staff also visit other pre-schools to share good practice.
- Staff plan an interesting and varied range of stimulating activities that helps children to make good progress in their learning. Children develop a good understanding of the positive impact animals can have in helping others who are visually impaired as they meet and learn about the role of a guide dog.

#### It is not yet outstanding because:

- Staff do not share enough information about how parents can extend individual children's learning even further at home.
- Staff do not make the best possible use of their own observations and the initial information they obtain from parents to precisely plan for children's next steps in learning from the outset.
- Children are not able to explore the whole of their outdoor area and enjoy vigorous exercise during the winter months.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- enhance the support offered to parents to help them to extend children's individual learning at home
- make best use of the initial information obtained when children begin attending to plan more precisely for their continued progress from an early stage
- provide more opportunities for children to explore the whole of the outdoor area and enjoy vigorous exercise.

### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and outdoors and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector spoke to staff and interacted and spoke to children during the inspection.
- The inspector completed a joint observation with the manager.
- The inspector held a meeting with the manager and provider. She looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of staff working in the pre-school.
- The inspector spoke to parents during the inspection and took account of their views.

# **Inspection findings**

#### Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The newly appointed managers demonstrate that they are ambitious and committed to their roles. All staff are reflective and regularly evaluate the provision they offer. The manager thoroughly monitors children's progress. Swift action is taken to address any gaps in children's learning. The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. The manager and staff demonstrate a good understanding of how to identify any children who may be at risk of harm. They know the action to take if they have concerns about a child's welfare. Staff work in successful partnership with other providers that children attend to support their continuity of learning. Children who have special educational needs and/or disabilities are very well supported. Staff work closely with other professionals and children's parents, to agree and implement specific activities that enable children to make good progress in relation to their starting points.

#### Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Children are motivated to learn and engage in activities with enthusiasm in this vibrant pre-school. For instance, children experiment with filling empty soap bottles with pump mechanisms in a variety of ways, such as squeezing sponges soaked in water. Children concentrate for long periods of time and solve problems, through trial and error. They work out that they need to fill the soap bottle with more water and push down on the pump several times to enable the water to dispense. Staff place a strong emphasis on promoting children's language skills. For instance, they introduce children to words in context to their actions. Staff provide children with a wide range of interesting resources that helps to stimulate their vivid imaginations. Children use cardboard boxes and tubes to create a space rocket and pretend that they are flying to the moon.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

All staff are positive role models. Children behave well, use good manners and demonstrate that they are fully aware of the boundaries in place. Group time is a positive experience for children. They demonstrate friendly relationships as they choose a friend to dance with and clap each other to acknowledge their achievements. Staff work in partnership with parents to sensitively prepare and support children who are experiencing changes in their lives.

#### **Outcomes for children are good**

Children are independent. They happily carry out age-appropriate responsibilities. Children develop a good understanding of mathematics. They join in with counting songs and use their fingers to represent different quantities. Children learn to link letters to the sounds that they represent and are beginning to write their own name. Children gain the necessary skills needed to help prepare them for their future learning at school.

Chiswell Preschool registered in 2015. It employs 13 members of childcare staff. Of these, two hold qualified teacher status and 10 hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 2 or above. The pre-school opens from 9am until 3pm, Monday to Thursday and from 9am until 12 noon on Friday, during term time only. It provides funded early education for two, three- and four-year-old children.
