The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a good understanding of safeguarding. She knows how to assess and minimise the risks for children within her home. She is aware of what steps to take if she has concerns about children's welfare, to keep them safe.
- The childminder understands the importance of regular observations and assessments. She knows how to support children in their next stage of learning.
- The childminder recognises the need to work closely with parents and others involved in children's learning, to help provide consistency in children's development.
- The childminder knows how to promote positive behaviour, and recognises the need to teach children to value and respect each other's differences.
- The childminder has a secure understanding of how to teach children about leading healthy lifestyles, including through regular exercise and healthy eating.
- The childminder recognises the benefit of regular self-evaluation, to help her identify and address the areas for further development. She understands the need to keep up to date with changes in practice and new legislation.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children.
