Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- Leaders and managers do not ensure that the premises is secure. Effective arrangements are not in place to prevent unauthorised persons entering the premises.
- Staff's safeguarding knowledge is not sufficient. They are unaware of what to do in the event of an allegation being made and lack understanding of possible risks to children.
- Leaders and managers do not ensure that necessary improvements are made in staff's practice. Consequently there is an inconsistency in staff performance which does not support the needs of children.
- Opportunities to develop children's communication and language are often lost as staff do not use open-ended questioning and extend children's vocabulary and thinking.
- Leaders and managers do not always deploy suitably skilled practitioners. They do not ensure that key persons are consistently available to meet children's individual needs and support their emotional welfare.
- Children who are learning English as an additional language do not receive good support from staff to develop their English language skills.
- The designated person with responsibility for supporting children with special educational needs and/or disabilities is not fulfilling the role effectively.

It has the following strengths

- Children have daily opportunities to play in the outdoor area where they enjoy fresh air and physical activity.
- Children are provided with healthy meals and snacks that meet their dietary needs.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

Safeguarding is not effective. Leaders and managers have failed to sustain improvements following the last inspection. For example, they do not ensure risk assessment is effective. Leaders and managers do not provide children with a secure and safe environment as unauthorised individuals can gain access to children. Staff's knowledge of safeguarding children is not robust. Staff do not know what to do in the event of an allegation or know when and how to take action after identifying a child at risk. Staff's safeguarding knowledge is not broad enough and does not include all potential safeguarding concerns. Leaders and managers do not ensure that necessary improvements to staff practice are implemented throughout the team. As a result, children's needs are not met.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is inadequate

Staff do not enable children to develop their communication, language and literacy skills consistently well during activities. Information from staff's assessment of the children is not always accurate and not well used to enable children to make the progress they should. For example, observations and assessments of children's learning do not provide meaningful information to help staff consider what children's next steps should be. Staff do not take time to listen to children and encourage them to take part. Staff do not have the teaching skills required to extend activities to provide for children who require more challenging activities to improve their learning. The key person system does not always work effectively to engage parents. Some parents are not aware of who their key person is.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Weaknesses in leadership and management result in staff not being vigilant enough to ensure that children are kept safe and to ensure their welfare is promoted. The key person system does not work effectively to support all children's emotional well-being. On the day of the inspection the preschool children were all without their key person. Staff do not include all children in activities consequently quieter children are not given opportunities to develop skills needed for their next stage of learning. Children are not encouraged to listen to each other and share and respect each others comments and opinions. Staff do not use open ended questions or encourage children to express their thoughts, contribute during activities and use new words.

Outcomes for children are inadequate

The weaknesses in the quality of teaching and the key person system result in outcomes for children that are not good enough. Children with special educational needs do not receive sufficient support from skilled and knowledgeable staff and do not progress as well as they should. Children with English as a second language do not receive enough opportunities to develop their language and communication skills. Children's progress is not sufficiently monitored or reliably assessed, consequently children are not fully prepared for school or their next stage of learning.

Seahorses Day Nursery registered in 2013 and operates from a church building in Enfield in the London Borough of Enfield. The nursery is open every weekday from 7.30am to 6.30pm, term time only. The nursery receives funding for the provision of free early education for children aged two, three and four years. There are seven members of staff, of whom six staff hold relevant early years qualifications. The owner/manager holds early years professional status.

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
