Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Staff provide sensitive support to help children develop strong bonds with them. Children settle guickly and make friends. They are happy, confident and eager to learn.
- Parents value the nursery and praise the warm and friendly environment. They are well informed about their children's care and learning needs. Staff regularly seek their views and provide ideas for them to continue children's learning at home.
- The quality of teaching is good. Staff carefully monitor children's learning, make accurate assessments and use these to plan children's next steps. Staff plan interesting, purposeful activities that encourage children to explore and investigate.
- All children, including those who require extra support and those who speak English as an additional language, make good progress. Staff work effectively with other early years providers and outside professionals to meet children's needs.
- The management team continually evaluates the service it provides to improve children's learning, taking into account the views of parents, staff and children.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- At times, staff do not fully promote children's understanding of numbers and counting.
- Sometimes, children do not have enough opportunities to develop their imaginations.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- focus more closely on supporting children's understanding of numbers and counting
- improve opportunities for children to develop their imaginations.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities, indoors and outdoors, and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector completed a joint observation with the provider.
- The inspector held meetings with the provider and spoke to staff and children
- The inspector sampled a range of documentation, including children's records, safeguarding procedures, written policies and procedures.
- The inspector took account of the views of parents spoken to during the inspection.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. Managers use robust recruitment and induction systems to ensure that staff are suitable to care for children. Staff update their knowledge of safeguarding and fully understand their roles to keep children safe. Managers observe staff regularly and give them specific feedback to help them develop the quality of their practice. Staff attend training to strengthen their skills. For example, training has ensured that staff successfully implement new systems for tracking children's progress. Monitoring extends to different groups of children as well as individuals to determine if any area of teaching and learning needs further enhancement. For instance, the managers have recently improved technological learning opportunities for older children.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Skilled staff provide a broad range of stimulating activities for children of all ages. Older babies have plenty of space to practise walking. Staff stimulate children's emerging language and communication skills well. They repeat words and use gestures when babies begin to talk, for example, as they explore digging and making marks in damp sand. Staff encourage children to progressively build their physical skills. For instance, two-year-olds chose from a range of materials and carefully used glue spreaders to create colourful bird's nest pictures. Staff build children's interest in nature particularly well. For example, when older children became fascinated with small toy fish, staff encouraged them to suggest ideas why creatures, such as stingrays, look as they do.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children behave well and treat each other with respect and consideration. They learn to share resources fairly and take turns. Staff show children they value their ideas and opinions. Staff encourage children's independence from a very young age. Children of all ages enjoy a well-organised and resourced environment. They can easily access toys and equipment, which are carefully designed to support children's independent learning. Children take pride in caring for their environment, for example, by carefully tidying away their toys. They have ample opportunities to play outdoors and to be physically active.

Outcomes for children are good

Children are well prepared for the next stages of their learning and development, including starting school. Children are confident communicators and eager to learn and explore. They make good progress in developing their understanding of mathematical sizes. For example, younger children compare the length of their outdoor spades as they dig in the mud kitchen. From an early age, children develop a love of books and enjoy making marks with a range of items, such as brushes and pencils. Older children know some sounds that letters represent and can often read and write simple words.

The Lighthouse Nursery School re-registered in 2016 as a limited company. The nursery operates from a single-storey purpose-built setting in the village of Newington, near Wallingford, Oxfordshire. The nursery is open each weekday from 8am to 5.30pm for the whole year, except for one week in the summer and one week at Christmas. The nursery employs 17 members of staff, 12 of whom have appropriate early years qualifications ranging from levels 2 to 5, while two have qualified teacher status. The nursery follows the Montessori educational philosophy.

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
