Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Staff establish secure and trusting relationships with children and get to know their individual personalities well. Children have positive levels of well-being and self-esteem.
- Staff build and maintain positive relationships with parents and keep them fully involved in their children's learning. For example, they regularly share children's achievements.
- The manager and staff establish good links with other early years professionals. For instance, they regularly share children's progress with other settings that children also attend. This helps to provide children with a good, consistent approach to their shared care and learning experiences.
- All children have good opportunities to challenge their physical skills. For example, they learn to move safely in interesting ways, such as confidently climbing up cargo nets.
- Staff encourage children to develop skills that help prepare them for their eventual move to school. Children are independent and confidently choose their own play.
- Children have good opportunities to develop their imagination. They enjoy a wide range of role-play opportunities, such as becoming 'nurses' at the 'hospital'.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- Staff do not consistently organise larger group activities well to ensure that all children remain fully engaged in their learning opportunities.
- Staff miss some opportunities to encourage children to extend their early writing skills even further.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- review and improve the organisation of larger group activities to help ensure that all children remain fully engaged in their learning experiences
- provide more challenging opportunities for children to develop their early writing skills.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the staff interacting with children and assessed the impact on children's learning.
- The inspector viewed the indoor and outdoor learning environments.
- The inspector looked at written documentation, including evidence of the suitability of all those working at the nursery school.
- The inspector spoke to children, parents and staff and considered their views.
- The inspector carried out a joint observation with the manager.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The manager and staff effectively review and make positive improvements to their practice together. For example, they evaluate how well activities interest children and use the feedback to support their future activity plans. This helps staff to keep children motived to learn. The manager closely monitors the quality of care and learning that staff provide children. For instance, she holds regular individual meetings with staff to discuss their performance and to highlight any training needs. Staff attend a good range of beneficial training to help keep their skills and knowledge up to date and build on them further. For example, they have learned different ways to help children develop their communication and language skills, such as simple signing. Staff use additional funding effectively to meet children's individual needs. For instance, they have purchased additional resources to interest children in exploring nature. Safeguarding is effective. The manager and staff have a good knowledge of the safeguarding procedures to follow to help protect children's safety and welfare. This includes completing thorough risk assessments of the setting and equipment to ensure that they remain safe and secure.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The manager and staff effectively monitor the progress of individual and specific groups of children. This enables them to identify any gaps in their development quickly. Staff provide children with good support to help close these gaps promptly. Staff build on children's interests well. For example, children who enjoy a book about insects are encouraged to carry out regular bug hunts using magnifying glasses. Staff support children to develop good communication skills. For instance, they ask children thought-provoking questions and give them time to think and then respond.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children are polite and behave well. For example, they respect the rules and boundaries. Children develop good social skills. They are happy to play together and take turns and share resources. Children develop a good understanding of healthy eating. For example, they enjoy harvesting their own healthy snacks, such as raspberries. All children have good opportunities to learn about the wider world around them. For instance, they learn about traditional events such as Diwali, the festival of light.

Outcomes for children are good

All children, including those who speak English as an additional language, make good progress. Children gain good mathematical skills to support their future learning. For example, they confidently count as they play. Children learn about more complicated concepts. For example, they hold a tarantula and snake and learn about why and how they shed their skin. They are keen to investigate the old skin up close.
