# **Summary of key findings for parents**

# This provision is good

- The newly appointed manager has made a number of improvements since the last inspection. She is ambitious and communicates high expectations to all. Clear and concise action plans have been implemented to achieve and maintain good standards.
- An effective key-person system is in place. Children form strong bonds with their key person and are relaxed in their care. This helps to support children's emotional well-being and growing self-confidence.
- Children are happy and settled. They have fun and enjoy their time at the warm and welcoming nursery. Children are articulate and confident during their play and interact positively with their peers and visitors.
- Staff are good role models and children behave well. Children are encouraged to share, show kindness to each other, to listen and not to use loud voices when playing inside.
- Partnerships with parents, other providers and professionals are good. Information about children is shared in a range of ways. This contributes strongly to meeting children's needs and ensuring consistency in their care and learning.

# It is not yet outstanding because:

- Sometimes, the planned next steps in children's learning are too broad. This means staff are not able to plan precisely enough to ensure children make even better progress.
- Professional development is not specifically focused on raising the quality of teaching to an outstanding level.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

## To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- plan even more precisely for children's learning to make sure their identified next steps are more specific and achievable so that they make even better progress
- build on plans for professional development to precisely identify ways to help raise the quality of teaching to an outstanding level.

## **Inspection activities**

- The inspector had a tour of the premises and observed children engaged in a variety of learning experiences indoors and outdoors.
- The inspector observed and evaluated a learning activity with the manager.
- The inspector viewed evidence of the suitability of staff working at the nursery.
- The inspector talked to the manager about her priorities for improvement.
- The inspector spoke to staff and children at appropriate times during the inspection. She also took account of the views of parents through various documentation.

# **Inspection findings**

## Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The manager is experienced, knowledgeable and highly organised. She monitors the quality of teaching and the progress children make. Any gaps in learning and development are quickly identified and children swiftly receive any additional support they may need. The manager works alongside the staff daily and has an accurate overview of the quality of the nursery. Staff morale is high and they work well together to build on their strengths and identify areas for improvement. Supervisory meetings for staff enable the manager to identify training and development opportunities and discuss how they can enhance the experiences offered to children. Safeguarding is effective. Staff are well-informed and understand how to recognise possible signs and symptoms of abuse. They are confident in the procedures to follow if they have concerns about a child's welfare.

## Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff organise a wide range of interesting and exciting play activities suited to the age and stage of children's development. They encourage children to explore and develop their own ideas. For example, young children relish in messy play. They investigate textures, such as paint. They enthusiastically make marks with their fingers and excitedly add small balls to the paint tray. Children think and predict as they fill and empty different sized containers with soapy water. Staff support children's emerging language very well. They use associative sounds and single words to enhance children's language as they play. Young children show amusement when staff pop bubbles and splash the water.

## Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Staff promote children's health and physical development effectively. Children enjoy healthy snacks and well-balanced meals which are prepared by the on-site cook. They explore the outdoor space with enthusiasm and excitement. Pre-school children play ball games and use their imagination as they pretend to hop like frogs. Young children confidently ride on wheeled toys and make marks with chalk. Staff provide activities which reflect and value the diversity of children's backgrounds. Children make Mother's Day cards on different dates, dependent on the countries where it is celebrated.

#### **Outcomes for children are good**

All children make good progress and are working at typical levels of development for their age. They are confident, keen and enthusiastic learners. Pre-school children use technology to learn about the life cycle of frogs and are fascinated as they explore tadpoles in a tank. Children's independence is encouraged during routines of the day. They pour their own drinks and put on their coats for outdoor play. Children enjoy making marks, listen attentively to stories and enthusiastically join in with songs and rhymes. They are focused and show high levels of concentration as they build with construction toys. Children use their imagination and are proud of their creations.
