## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The qualified childminder understands how young children learn and develop. She knows how to observe, assess and monitor children's development and use this information to plan experiences that will promote their ongoing learning. The childminder understands how to help children develop the skills they need for school.
- The childminder demonstrates a good knowledge of child protection procedures. She can identify the possible signs of abuse and neglect and understands the action to take should she have any concerns about a child's welfare.
- The childminder knows how to evaluate her practice and provision to make ongoing improvements. She recognises the value of training and professional development.
- The childminder understands the importance of providing children with healthy foods and regular physical activity. She describes how she will use her gardens, walks to the park and outings in the community to help children develop their physical skills.
- The childminder understands the importance of working closely with parents and gathering information from them in order to help her support their children's learning.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to support children's learning when children are in her care and undertake observation, assessment and planning.
- The inspector viewed a range of policies and documents that the childminder plans to use when caring for children.
- The inspector checked evidence of the childminder's suitability, qualifications and training certificates. She discussed self-evaluation and checked the childminder's understanding of the legal requirements.
- The inspector viewed all areas of the childminder's premises where childcare is to be provided. She discussed how the childminder intends to organise play resources to support children's learning.
