Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Staff have a good knowledge of children's interests and use these to provide an inviting setting that encourages children to explore and learn. Children make good progress in all areas of development.
- Children and their families are warmly greeted by staff on arrival and welcomed into the pre-school. Children arrive happy and eager to play, and settle quickly.
- Staff get to know individual children and their personalities well, including their routines. Effective key-person arrangements help children to feel secure and ensure their needs are met.
- Staff have a good understanding of safeguarding procedures and their responsibilities should they have any concerns about a child. They are familiar with new initiatives in this area to prevent children being placed in situations where they may be at risk.
- The manager and staff have developed good partnerships with parents. For example, they communicate with them in a variety of ways and hold parents' evenings to share information about their children's learning.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- At times, some staff do not support or extend learning opportunities during planned activities, to promote children's development fully.
- The organisation of some group activities for younger and less-confident children does not consistently engage them and encourage their participation fully.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- strengthen further staff's practice with regard to enabling them to extend and challenge children's learning consistently during planned activities
- develop the organisation of activities for younger and less-confident children, so that they can fully participate and engage in the learning experiences provided.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed activities and staff's interactions with children indoors and outdoors.
- The inspector spoke to children, staff and the manager at appropriate times during the inspection.
- The inspector took part in a joint observation with the manager.
- The inspector viewed a range of written documentation and tracked some children's progress.
- The inspector spoke to parents to gain their views about the setting and staff.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. Staff know about their role in reporting any concerns about a child through local referral procedures. The manager provides regular feedback about staff's performance, which assists staff to assess the quality of the provision continually and meet the children's individual needs. Regular meetings with the team allow time to reflect on practice and drive improvement. Procedures for staff recruitment are robust. Parents comment positively on how staff support children and their families and work closely with them to promote consistency in children's care and learning.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff are well qualified and understand how children learn and develop. They provide children with an environment that motivates them to explore independently. The manager and staff effectively monitor the progress of individual and different groups of children. This enables them to identify any gaps in children's development and take steps to close these. For example, when staff recognise that a child is not progressing as well in mathematics as in other areas, they plan activities to address this. They seek advice and support from other professionals, such as speech and language therapists, when needed. Staff help children to think through and communicate their ideas well. For instance, as staff recall the story of 'Jack and the Beanstalk', they encourage children to talk about how Jack got the beans and what happens next in the story.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children are very happy and settled at the setting. Parents confirm that their children settled very quickly when they started and thoroughly enjoy their time. Children have formed strong bonds with staff and other children, but also demonstrate the independence to play on their own. Staff provide children with daily opportunities to be active. For example, in the garden, children use different climbing equipment and enjoy having the space to run around and be exuberant. Children behave well. Staff promote a polite and courteous environment. Children quickly learn how to share and take turns with toys and play cooperatively with their friends.

Outcomes for children are good

All children make good progress from their starting points, including those who are in receipt of additional funding and those who have special educational needs (SEN) and/or disabilities. They gain the skills needed for school, such as independence, confidence and self-control. All children, even the youngest, are learning to manage their own personal needs. For example, they wash their hands, use the toilet and get ready to go outside.

Hampton Magna Preschool registered in 1985. The pre-school is open Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays from 9.30am to 4pm, during school term time only. The pre-school employs three members of childcare staff, two of whom hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 3. The manager holds a level 6 qualification. The pre-school provides funded early education for three- and four-year-old children. It supports a number of children who have SEN and/or disabilities and receives support from the local authority.

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
