## The provision meets requirements

- The childminder knows how to support children's physical well-being, such as through healthy diets and daily exercise. She knows how to promote children's positive attitude to healthy eating by encouraging their involvement in mealtime activities.
- The childminder is aware of the process to follow if she has a concern over a child's welfare. She understands how to keep the premises free from hazards.
- The childminder understands the importance of sharing regular information with parents and other professionals who work with children, to help provide consistency for children's learning and care.
- The childminder understands the importance of self-evaluation. She knows how to seek the views of others to help her reflect on her service. She understands the importance of developing her skills and knowledge to continually improve outcomes for children.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The childminder registered in 2009. She lives in Carshalton, located in the London Borough of Sutton. The childminder provides before- and after-school care from Monday to Thursday, 7am to 8.50am and 3pm to 7pm, during term time only. The childminder only provides care for children from Barrow Hedges Primary School. She holds a childcare qualification at level 3.
