The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a good understanding of how to prepare children for school. She intends to help them with a variety of activities, such as helping them to change for physical education classes.
- The childminder recognises the importance of developing her skills and keeping up to date with new guidelines and requirements. For example, she has updated her safeguarding policy to include new information to keep children safe.
- The childminder intends to reflect regularly on her practice and plans to seek the views of children and parents to help improve the quality of her setting.
- The childminder has a good understanding of children's unique needs and intends to plan activities to keep them motivated to learn.
- The childminder plans to teach children about how to keep safe and be aware of their own personal safety. For example, she plans to demonstrate how to cross a road safely.
- The childminder knows how to encourage children's good behaviour and support a healthy lifestyle.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
