# Summary of key findings for parents

## This provision is good

- Children enter the setting happily and form strong bonds with familiar staff who ensure they feel safe and secure. They enjoy a well-resourced and organised play environment, which stimulates their learning and helps them to make choices for themselves.
- Staff carefully consider children's interests, learning priorities and their special educational needs as they plan activities, providing a range of experiences across the educational programme. They assess and monitor children's progress effectively. Children make good progress from their unique starting points.
- Leaders and managers have made good progress since their last inspection. They use detailed evaluations to identify accurately areas for development, including ways to improve the quality and consistency of teaching.
- Staff support children well to develop their communication and language skills. For example, children participate enthusiastically in an interactive story. They listen carefully, follow instructions and move in different ways, copying staff's actions accurately as they make connections between the word and the movement.

## It is not yet outstanding because:

- Staff do not make the best use of opportunities to develop children's mathematical ideas and challenge their thinking in activities that they choose for themselves.
- Staff do not consistently help children to look at similarities, differences, patterns and changes in living things, in particular their fascination with insects.

## What the setting needs to do to improve further

## To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- develop further children's understanding of mathematical concepts in their self-chosen play
- help children to look more closely at similarities, differences, patterns and changes between living things.

#### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector observed staff's interactions and quality of teaching as children played inside and outside.
- The inspector completed a joint observation with the manager.
- The inspector held discussions with the manager, staff and children at convenient times during the inspection.
- The inspector considered the written views of parents.
- The inspector sampled a range of documentation, including children's assessment records, suitability and vetting arrangements for the committee and staff, and the preschool's self-evaluation.

## **Inspection findings**

## Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. Managers and staff understand their responsibilities and demonstrate confidence in the procedures they must follow if they have concerns about a child's welfare. There are effective partnerships with local agencies and professionals to continue to share information and meet children's individual needs. There are good arrangements to ensure the suitability of staff and committee members for their roles. Leaders provide good support for staff's professional development. For example, training has improved staff's understanding of different strategies to support children's behaviour according to their needs. Managers evaluate the setting effectively. For example, having recognised that some parents do not share information about their children's learning at home, managers have used alternative methods to engage with them.

## Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff gather useful information from parents about their children's developmental starting points and use this information effectively to plan initial activities. Staff keep parents well informed about their children's progress. Staff deploy themselves effectively to support children's learning. Their positive interactions, including effective questioning, help children to enjoy and become actively involved in their learning. For example, children show curiosity as staff encourage them to see what happens to the soil in the sieve. Children respond well to questions and, when the larger lumps of soil do not fall, they comment 'the big ones are stuck' and decide the best way to solve the problem.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Staff work closely with local schools to ensure there is a smooth transition to support children's emotional well-being. Children behave well and play nicely together, such as sharing foam bricks to construct towers. Children show great pride in their achievements. For example, they are keen to share what they have designed using recycled materials. Children relish the opportunity to complete tasks and are very helpful. They follow routines well to keep themselves safe and healthy, such as wearing sun hats when they are outside and washing hands before they eat.

#### **Outcomes for children are good**

Children gain the skills they require for their eventual move to school. They are confident in familiar routines. For example, when they arrive children find their name card independently, learning to recognise their name. Older children begin to recognise letter sounds and write recognisable letters. Younger children show an interest in how things work, for example, as they use the till in their imaginative play. Children show an interest in books and labels, in particular to find out more about the insects they discover. Children confidently talk about the models they have made from recycled materials.

Playdays Pre-school registered in 1992. It operates from the Methodist church hall in Chard, Somerset. The pre-school is open during school term time on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 9am to 3pm. The pre-school is in receipt of free early years funding to provide places for children aged two, three and four years. The committee employ five members of staff; of these, one holds an early years qualification at level 5, three hold early years qualifications at level 3 and one holds an early years qualification at level 2.

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
