#### **Parkview Care (Broadstairs) Limited**

Monitoring visit
Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

#### Information about this children's home

This children's home is operated by a private company which runs several similar homes. It is registered to accommodate up to three children. The statement of purpose for the home says that it cares for children who require their health, development and welfare to be promoted and to be protected from harm. The company has a school which children may attend.

The home has been without a registered manager since March 2018.

## This monitoring visit

This children's home was judged requires improvement to be good at the full inspection on 21 June 2018. Five requirements were issued. Following the inspection in June, new information was received that increased concerns about the shortfalls identified during the inspection. This included details of a new placement at the home that had broken down very quickly. This monitoring visit was conducted to follow up on these developments.

The inspector identified the following shortfalls:

- No progress had been made in establishing normal routines and structure for the child in the home, including his engagement in education.
- Significant risks for the child, identified at the previous inspection, had not been addressed and in some instances had increased. Staff had repeatedly been unable to prevent the child from engaging in serious risk-taking behaviours and the overall safety of the child had deteriorated to dangerous levels.
- Staffing capacity had reduced. The staff's experience and expertise were insufficient to keep the child safe and support his progress. A number of staff had left, and the overall stability of the staff team had deteriorated.
- The poor admission practice identified at the previous inspection had been

repeated. A child was admitted to the home before his needs and associated risks had been understood. Managers and leaders had failed to assess if the staff team had the skills and ability to meet the child's needs. The staff were unable to prevent him from going missing from the home soon after his arrival. He has not returned to the home and the placement was ended.

This monitoring visit found a decreasing capacity to keep the child safe and support his necessary progress. Further, no improvement in risk management strategies had been made and there were real, increasing threats to the child's safety and well-being. As a result of these significant concerns, a notice to suspend the home's registration was issued on 19 July 2018. This will remain in effect until 11 October 2018.

Ofsted will continue to monitor the progress of leaders and managers in meeting the previous requirements.

In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to ensure—that staff—help each child to achieve the child's education and training targets, as recorded in the child's relevant plans; support each child's learning and development, including helping the child to develop independent study skills and, where appropriate, helping the child to complete independent study; understand the barriers to learning that each child may face and take appropriate action to help the child to overcome any such barriers; help each child to understand the importance and value of education, learning, training and employment; promote opportunities for each child to learn informally; and help a child who is excluded from school, or who is of compulsory school age but not attending school, to access educational and training support throughout the period of exclusion or non-attendance and to return to school as soon as possible. The protection of children standard is that children are protected from harm and enabled to keep themselves safe. In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to ensure—that staff—assess whether each child is at risk of harm, taking into account information in the child's relevant plans, and, if necessary, make arrangements to reduce the risk of any harm to the child; help each child to understand how to keep safe; have the skills to identify and act upon signs that a child is at risk of harm; understand the roles and responsibilities in relation to protecting children that are assigned to them by the registered person; and are familiar with, and act in accordance with, the home's child protection policies. The leadership and management standard is that the registered person enables, inspires and leads a culture in relation to the children's home that—helps children aspire to fulfil their potential; and promotes their welfare.  In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to—lead and manage the home in a way that is consistent with the approach and ethos, and delivers the outcomes, set out in the home's statement of purpose; ensure that staff work as a team where appropriate; ensure that staff have the experience, qualifications and skills to meet the needs of each child; ensure that the home has sufficient staff to provide care for each child; and ensure that the home's workforce provides continuity of care to each child. (Regulation 13 (1)(a)(b)(2)(a)(b)(c)(d)(e))	10/08/2018
The care planning standard is that children— receive effectively planned care in or through the children's home; and have a positive experience of arriving at or moving on from the home.  In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to ensure— that children are admitted to the home only if their needs are within the range of needs of children for whom it is intended that the home is to provide care and accommodation, as set out in the home's statement of purpose.
